Mime, Carpentier, Managers Deschamps of Paris and Jack Curly of New York, his American and French mentors, and Jules Lanares and Jacques Wilson, sparring partner and trainer, with valets and maids, made up the party. The celebrated brave Frenchman was met at the Union Station by Mayor Church and several other prominent citizens and officers, and given an official welcome there and at the city hall. At noon Carpentier and Alf Shrubb were the guests at luncheon at the King Edward Hotel, given by the Sportsmen's Patriotic Association, where congraturatory and patriotic speeches were the order. Georges replied to the toast of his health in French. He said:

"I wish to tell you of the sentiments of the people of France to the boys from Canada whose wonderful heroism during midst the game of boxing will be elements of the greater heights than it has

He never abused his sparring partners and always makes them yell when he gets to coming too strong.
