OUR HARD WHEAT AND OUR NEIGHBORS.

The news in The World yesterday from Washington, to the effect that congress was to be asked to allow Canadian hard wheat for seed purposes to enter the United States free of duty is very significant and directly in line with what this paper has been saying for some time in regard to an export duty on Canadian wheat going into the United States.

There is no doubt of this fact, that by

There is no doubt of this fact, that by

reason of exhaustion of the soil the Northwestern States are no longer able to raise a high grade of No. 1 hard wheat; but what is true of these states is coming true in the Canadian west. We showed in these columns two days ago that the hard wheat line keeps noving farther west and farther north, just as the virgin soil is exhausted. If we are to maintain our supremacy for hard wheat, we must change our methods. The people of the Northwest must return to the soil what they take out of it, and we know no better me thod of doing this than by scientific cultivation and by the grinding of the grain in Canada and the feeding of the bran and shorts in Canada, and in that way returning the necessary plant food back to the soil.

The Canadian west has another pro lem in the weed plague, which has become a veritable nuisance to many of the wheat farmers of the west. To go on exhausting the soil and returning nothing to it, and to grow wheat to be ground in American mills, is a policy of hard wheat suicide. The western farmer must become sufficiently foresighted and far-seeing to realize that he will not ong have his supremacy for hard wheat inless he adopts a system of cultivation and supports a fiscal policy that will work this out for him, and we are confident that by pursuing the wise policy we recommend he will both now and in the long run get a better price for his wheat.

the Roosevelt cabinet: Washington, Jan. 4.- The brief of the government in the case of Swift & Co. versus the United States, the beef trust case, prepared by Attorney-General Moody, was presented to the supreme court of the United States to-day. The brief is devoted principally to an argument to show that the packers are engaged in a conspiracy to mo nopolize interstate commerce in fresh meats.

The attorney-general says: "It may be remarked that judges have differed as to the validity of aggregations of capital effected by some form of organic union between several smaller and competing corporations, and economists are far from agreeing that such aggrega-tions, within limitations, are hurt-So, too, associations of manufacturers to regulate competition within a restricted area have not always been condemned by courts, and have sometimes been approved by publicists. 
