# GEO. ARMSTRONG KILLED AT WORK IN C.P.B. YAROS

Early Morning Tragedy Disclosed by Finding of Mangled Bedy.

For he third time in as many days the life of a railroad man has been claimed by the traffic in the vicinity of Toronto. The last victim was George Armstrong, C. P. R. yardman, who was killed at Parkdale yards early

to the tender.

A short distance behind the train was found his mangled body. He was quite dead. The remains were taken to the morgue, where an inquest will be held. The accident occurred within 100 feet from the place where another vardman was killed three weeks ago.

Armstrong was a single man, 22 years of age, and lived at 86 Oak-avenue.

any other day.






