# CANADA IGNORED BRITAIN IN NEGOTIATING TREATIES

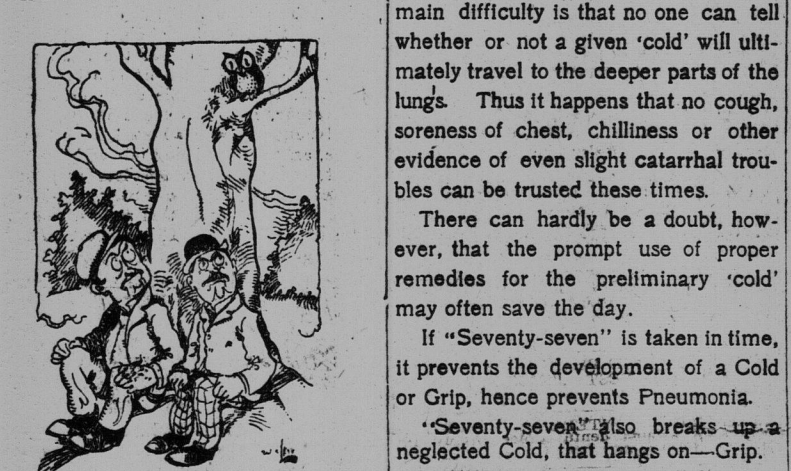
She Did Business With Continental Countries Direct and There is Much Comment—Sir Wilfrid Laurier Maintains a Strict Silence.

Montreal, April 26.—A special London cable to the Star says: The disclosures of Canada's negotiations with continental countries and Sir Richard Cartwright's confirmation have become the general subject of political discussion, especially in view of next week's conference debates on the preference. They are underlying the editorials in many of the London and provincial journals this morning. Sir Wilfrid Laurier today gave an interview to a reporter who handed the premier copies of the Times and Reuters' despatches from Ottawa.

"Well," said Sir Wilfrid in his most mystical way. "I thought," said the Star representative, "you might perhaps find it convenient to make a statement." The premier replied with decided emphasis: "On this subject I have nothing to say." "Do you deny the accuracy of the statement?" he was asked. "No," replied the premier, "I do not deny, nor," he added after a pause, "do I confirm." Then becoming the questioner he remarked: "May I ask where the Star obtained its information?" He was told: "From what we have reason to believe is a good source, Sir Wilfrid, and seeing the obvious public importance at this moment of imperial action."

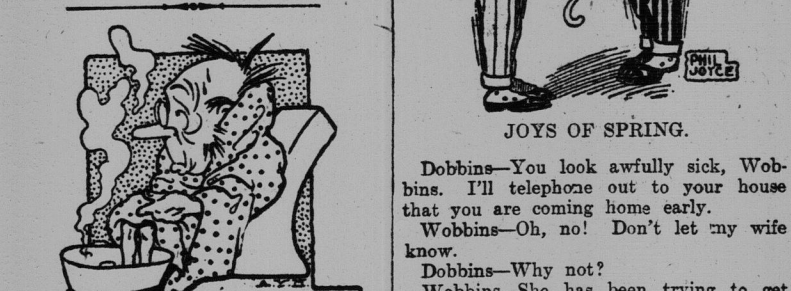
### The Day's Fable

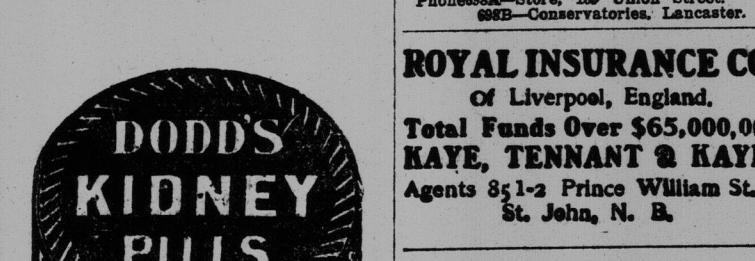

### THE FARRELL CASE

James Manchester Denies All Responsibility for the Prospectus of the Portland Rolling Mills Co.

The case of Michael Farrell vs. Jas. Manchester, R. C. Elkin and the Portland Rolling Mills Co., Ltd., was resumed in the equity court before Judge Barker yesterday afternoon, and after hearing of further testimony, adjournment was made until 10:30 o'clock this morning. R. C. Elkin, as manager and director of the Portland Rolling Mills, Limited, said he hired F. S. Sharp in June 1905 to sell stock to the public to the amount of \$20,000. This was approved of by the president, James Manchester. Mr. Sharp had been given access to the company's books. He said that before the prospectus of the strength of which the plaintiff alleges to have purchased \$30,000 worth of the stock, was issued, Sharp went to witness and asked him to look through it. He had done so and offered some objections. Mr. Perkins, in his evidence taken under commission in Chicago last fall, swore that Mr. Elkin put the prospectus in his (Perkins') hands and approved of it in his presence. He also swore that he personally gave the prospectus to James Manchester, the president of the company, and that Mr. Manchester did not open and read it, he took it and kept it, and further that Mr. Manchester authorized him (Perkins) to write a letter which was attached to the prospectus and signed by the company.

Mr. Manchester, sworn, said that he had not been shown the prospectus by anybody else than Mr. Elkin. He had never confirmed it, and to his knowledge, it had not been confirmed by the board of directors. He had strongly opposed selling the stock at seventy cents on the dollar but notwithstanding the board passed a resolution to sell it at that figure.
