

is principally occupied by private residences, among which are Elmsley Villa and grounds (the residence of his Excellency the Governor General), the lodge entrance to which is occupied by two non-commissioned officers and twelve privates of the 71st Highland Light Infantry, which compose the Governor General's guard. A little further north, occupying a commanding situation, is Kearsney House, the handsome residence of William Proudfoot, Esq.; this building is designed in the Roman villa style. Still further on is Clover Hill, the residence of Samuel P. Jarvis, Esq. Wickham Lodge, the residence of the Hon. Mr. Justice Macaulay, is also situated on this street, a little south of the College-avenue. There are many prettily situated streets running east out of this section of Yonge-street, the most remarkable of which are Gerrard and Carleton-streets, and the Sydenham Road (or St. Paul's street), adjoining the thriving village of Yorkville. The first-mentioned (Gerrard-street) commences nearly opposite the residence of the Hon. Mr. Justice Sullivan, and is the handsomest street of private residences in Toronto. Among the many dwellings situated on it, those of J. S. Howard, J. A. Smith and Alex. Dixon, Esqs., are the most imposing. Sydenham-road, or St. Paul's street, which is situated partly within and partly without the liberties, is a favourite and rather fashionable retreat. The villa residences here are both numerous and handsome. The modest and unpretending little suburban church of St. Paul, is situated in this locality; from the upper end of the street, where a blockhouse is erected, a charming view may be had of the romantic and beautiful grounds of Rose Dale, the residence of Mr. Sheriff Jarvis.

*Front-street*, running parallel with the bay, is another street of considerable magnitude, extending from the Market-square to the garrison. The western portion is principally occupied with private residences, some of which are very handsome. Among these may be mentioned the residence of Mrs. Jones, (widow of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Jones,) the spacious residences of the Hon. Robert Baldwin and of the Hon. George Crookshank; the Bishop of Toronto's palace; Lyndhurst, the residence of Frederick Widder, Esq.; the new and tasteful residences of J. G. Spragge and Alfred Coulson, Esquires. The Parliament Buildings and Knox's College are also situated on this street. The southern side of *Front-street* extending along the Bay shore, is principally occupied with factories and manufactories of different kinds, the most extensive of which are the chair and furniture manufactory of Messrs. Jacques & Hay, and the Ontario Brewery. The Custom House, Telegraph and Royal Engineer Offices, the Steamboat Offices, the wharves, and the American and North American Hotels, are likewise situated on this street.

*Queen-street* is another of the leading streets of the city, and is divided, like several other streets, into east and west: it extends from the Don-bridge in the east, to the Lunatic Asylum,—a distance of over three miles. The public buildings on this street are the Asylum, at its extreme west, Osgoode Hall, a little east of the College-avenue, and Knox's church,—quite a gem of its kind. The principal private residences westward, are Bellevue-terrace, the residence of George Denison, sr., Esq., situated at the head of an avenue of the same name; Gore Vale, the residence of Miss Cameron, which is approached through a handsome avenue; the Meadows, the residence of the Hon. John Hillyard Cameron; and the Hon. Mr. Justice McLean's residence, the principal entrance to which is by Peter-street. On the east end of this street we have Moss Park, the residence of the Hon. William
