TURF

In England

Despite the gradual curtailment of racing in England and its final suspension, the falling off in breeding race horses has not yet amounted to anything.

This is shown quite convincingly by the number of thoroughbred foals reported in 1916 to the custodians of the General Stud-Book. The total last year reached 3,412, as against 3,567 in 1915 and 3,383 in 1914.

By opponents of two-year-old racing the temporary suspension of the sport may not be regarded as an unmitigated evil. It will save at least one crop of foals from the ordeal of meeting the turf test at the usual immature age and perhaps serve to answer, when racing is resumed, the long disputed question as to whether the starting of two-year-olds ought to be encouraged, discouraged or forbidden.

FOR PROHIBITION IN DOMINION DURING THE WAR

Resolution Passed by the Anglican Synod of Nova Scotia

Following the presentation of the report of the Diocesan Commission on Social Service, the Anglican Synod of Nova Scotia passed the following resolution.

"Resolved that the Synod of Nova Scotia hereby reaffirms its resolution, passed at the Synod of 1915, asking that in order effectively to safeguard our manhood and conserve our food supplies."

should be enacted as will provide during the present crisis the fullest possible measure of prevention of the sale and use of alcoholic liquor as a beverage.

"Further resolved that this Synod places on record its appreciation of the action of the provincial legislature in extending the Nova Scotia temperance act to the whole province, its recognition of the good results which have followed from its more vigorous enforcement, and its earnest desire that no effort may be spared to secure the best possible results from the enforcement of this act;

"Further resolved that this Synod respectfully urge upon the Dominion government the pressing need of passing at this session of parliament an act forbidding the manufacture, importation and sale of alcoholic liquor, except for sacramental, medicinal and industrial purposes, for the period of the war, in order effectively to safeguard our manhood and conserve our food supplies."

Sir Robert Baden-Powell, chief scout of the Boy Scouts of the British empire, has sent the following interesting message to Colin H. Livingstone, president of the national council, Boy Scouts of America:

On the great historical step taken by the United States in coming into the war I feel that I must send you my word of greeting from the boy scouts' point of view.

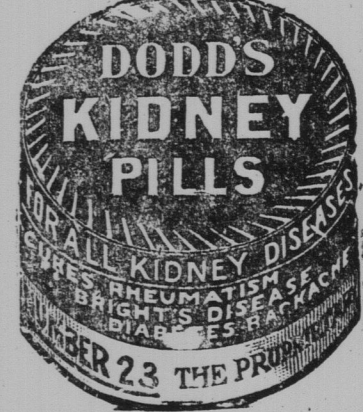
We are already bound to the boy scouts of America by the tie of brotherhood in working under the same laws and the same badge for the same ideals, and that tie is further strengthened by our mutual blood relationship and history.

The new bond of alliance in a common cause for justice and right will yet a stronger link in our mutual relationship in the future.

We have done war work over here in various forms behind the scenes, not necessarily involving the taking up of arms by boys under the age for military service, but by acting as watchers over railway bridges, telegraph and cable lines, reservoirs, power works, etc. The lads have done valuable national service.

Also they have performed the duties of orderlies in large number for the war office, admiralty, government and other offices and have carried out the coast watching service ever since the first outbreak of war. They have also supplied trained signallers and ambulance men where required. I mention these facts in case they may be suggestive to you in arranging duties for your scouts in their different localities.

I feel sure that with the training they have received the Boy Scouts of America are in a position to do very valuable service for their country behind the scenes in the present crisis and that over here shall watch their doings with
