**Controllers in London Hotels**

London, Nov. 12.—Considerable agitation has been aroused in London over the government's perpetual commandeering of hotels. The Star in vitriolic criticism says: "There seems to be something about our multitudinous government officials which makes it impossible for them to work except in hotels. They must have their bath, lounges, lifts, palm trees or we can't win the war. No sooner is a new department invented by the controller of controllers than the gentleman who gets the job looks for a hotel. Sir Alfred Mond mentioned in the house that 398 rooms in a hotel were occupied by the air board. It would be interesting to know how many rooms are used for making tea and toast. What we want is another controller to see that no department exceeds its room needs. But if they don't soon appoint him we won't have a hotel to commandeer."

It has been continually suggested that the government take over the clubs where access to the floor space is used by a few old men, who appear at the clubs infrequently. The annual Lord Mayor's banquet is going to be held under present conditions, where gorging is considered bad form. Lord Rhondda, food controller, who will be present, may possibly utilize the opportunity of impressing upon the city fathers the necessity for extreme economy. Bonar Law announced in the commons that he has been assured the food served would fall within the controller's rations.

**An Inspiring Scene In The Metropolitan**

Caruso Leads Singing of Star Spangled Banner

Four Others of World's Greatest Vocalists With Him And Chorus Takes Up Refrain—Wildly Patriotic Scene Attends Upon Surprise

New York, Nov. 12.—The Metropolitan opera season opened last night with a thrill not on the bills. The curtain had fallen on the second act of Verdi's "Aida" and the audience which packed the historic opera house from pit to top-most gallery was thundering its applause when the carthagenians and the throng was hushed.

Out from the wings in single file, led by Enrico Caruso, marched five of the world's greatest singers—Pasquale Amato, Claudio Muzio, Margareta Malanzena and Basil Raymond. Back of them all the members of the great chorus took their places.

No more dramatic and unexpected spectacle ever had been enacted in the Metropolitan and never before in New York had opera stars been greeted with such a tempest of applause. Rising with the first strains of the anthem, the great audience waited until the final notes and then burst into a veritable frenzy of patriotic cheers. Men and women in the glittering horseshoe of the Metropolitan galloped over their heads in their applause. General Director Gatti-Casazza had provided a surprise and proved that the Star Spangled Banner is not unworthy of great artists.
