

Left-Handed White Sure He Will Grab Light-Weight Title From Champion Welsh

Two boys who have fought him are firmly convinced that he is much over-estimated as a fighter. Some of the experts who have studied his style are puzzled to know whether he is not good or whether he has a lot in reserve. The popular verdict in favor of White in the Milwaukee affair was not the true one. As a matter of fact Welsh deserved a draw and perhaps had a trifling shade

over White. In the Shugrue affair Shugrue's flash and speed prejudiced observers. Two deep students of the game who watched that battle say Welsh had him well in hand at all times. Anyhow, Welsh has been smoked out of cover. He will have to show all his goods on the evening of January 26, or lose a title and, from the manner in which he has started to prepare for White he will not take this scrap jestingly, but will attempt to settle White's aspirations once and for all.

White has managed himself as the best left handed fighter in the country and the hardest hitter of his weight in the ring with his left. He packs a heavy punch in his right, but probably will depend upon his left to bring home the bacon.

He has one immense advantage; that is that he is absolutely confident that he can beat Welsh. He tested Welsh out in their meeting at Milwaukee and came out of the ring after missing the champion up badly in the last two rounds, expressing surprise that Welsh was not a better man.

This confidence is a big thing for any fighter. I know that White did not feel sure of Shugrue and in fact was more afraid that Shugrue would slip something over on him than he was that Welsh would whip him. He has had so much hard luck in this line of missing out just when the title was within reach that perhaps the fear that Shugrue would turn the trick was natural.

White is in better condition and is fighting better now than he ever has in his life. Every boy who has worked with him in gymnasiums believes this and the power of his left has been winging.

He has been keeping in perfect trim ever since there was a chance to force Welsh into a match and it is fortunate for him that he can finish training in New York without taking the long ride back and forth from Chicago.

As for Freddie Welsh, the simple truth is that the fight fans in America do not know how good this boy is or whether he is good or not. He has shown only flashes in America and since coming over has not been in ripest fighting condition.

Knowing that he was carded for a long run of rather hard short distance battles he made his conditions with that in view and did not try to make weight for each lad as they came.

Baseball Into Courts Summons have been issued for owners of the sixteen clubs in the National Baseball League and the American Baseball League, and members of the National Baseball Commission to appear before Judge Landis, of the United States District Court in Chicago on Jan. 20, for hearing of the injunction sought by the Federal League charging that organized baseball is operating in violation of the Sherman Anti-trust Law.

President Tener of the National League, declares he is ready for the legal fight and President Johnson, of the American League, professes contempt for the Federal methods.

According to a despatch from Atlanta, Ga., Manager Charles Herzog of the Cincinnati baseball team has signed Catcher Ivy Wingo, to a two-year contract. The catcher has been reported as having signed with the Federal League. Wingo's contract is with the St. Louis National League team, with whom he played last season.

John T. Slattery, formerly a catcher in the American and International Leagues, has been appointed coach of the Tufts College baseball team. Jack Dalton, outfielder for the Brooklyn National League team last year, has signed with the Boston Federals. When Mack brings his Athletics together in the spring ten of the men who won the world's championship in 1913 will be missing. The list of those who have gone includes Collins, Plank, Bender, Coombs, Daley, Danny Murphy, Orr Lavan, Houck and Brown.

The Boston Braves are scheduled to open their season against Harvard and they expect to end it against the Red Sox. Dick Rudolph, who lost a bet on Yale in the big game in the bowl, hopes to get square by fanning Brickley, Mahan and Charley Brickley of the Harvard baseball squad.

Caldwell Back to Yonkers

Ray Caldwell has signed with the Highlanders, showing that the major leagues are going after their star players who jumped their reservations. Last fall Caldwell had a row with Frank Chance and signed with the Buffalo club of the Federal League, receiving a bonus of \$2,000 and two notes. The notes he had discounted, and was in debt to the Buffalo club for \$5,000. This money will be sent back to Buffalo. Caldwell has said right along he was sorry that he had made the move, and was pleased when the New York club said it would send the money back to the Federals and sign him up to a long contract at better terms than he was to get in Buffalo.

Feds Will Fight


Club owners of the Federal League have paid out \$50,000 in 1914 salary advances to major and minor league stars who deserted organized baseball for the Federals, according to a statement by James A. Gilmore, president of the federal organization. Protection of this money, he said, is one of the objects of the league's suit filed against organized baseball charging it with operating in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The league proposes to fight to a finish," he said, "to protect this investment. In the event of a repulsion of legal controversies which impaired the 1914 season, when litigation caused several of our star players to sit idly on the bench all season, this money will be tied up in a knot that will take months to untangle. We propose to make ourselves certain of the results before the playing season begins."
