EARLY MILITARY BANDS

The Turkish army was the first to possess properly organized military bands. So far back as the 16th century each corps of Janissaries had a band comprising at least a dozen instruments, and frequently more. Towards the close of the seventeenth century, the Sultan presented to Augustus II, King of Poland and Elector of Saxony, a complete Janissary band and soon afterwards Frederick II. of Prussia received a similar mark of favor. These bands soon diminished by death

or desertion, and as the original players dropped off their places were taken by natives, while some of the Oriental instruments were discarded in favor of home-made ones. Oboes took the place of zarnas, bassoons those of big shawms, and horns and trumpets were added. But these characteristic procession instruments of the Turks previously unknown to the western world—brass drums, cymbals and triangles—kept their place as necessary ingredients of military music, and in a comparatively short time were introduced into all the regimental bands of Europe.—Pall Mall Gazette.

UNDER THE BEAR'S PAW GOOD OPERA HOUSE BILL

Russian Military Play and Entertaining List of Specialties

A captivating play of Russian military and diplomatic circles, "Under the Bear's Paw," was presented in a most attractive manner at the Opera House by the Young-Adams Co., last evening, and because of the excellent portrayal the sympathies of the audience were entirely with the young Russian soldier and the dainty American girl, Bessie Gray, though she had come to his country in a way as a spy, making copies of military defences.

The girl is taken prisoner and is fearful of the consequences until her soldier sweetheart, Captain Radloff, restores her confidence, and though she worries for a time at the dire results which must surely follow his interference against the wishes of the higher powers, all is made happy in the end. American naval officers who have come to the rescue have no need of further intervention—where the girl's heart is, that is her country.

The part of the entrancing young American woman who has won the heart of the Russian, and brought them both "under the bear's paw" is taken by Miss Adams, and particularly well played. She was at her best in some of the more trying, nerve-tense scenes, with emotion as the keynote and her enactment of the role was at once entertaining and pleasing. As the warm-hearted Russian officer who has risked his future for her, Mr. Young added further to his laurels already won.

The other roles were handled with cleverness. Mr. Lyon was seen to excellent advantage as Colonel Boris; Mr. Rowland as General Onoroff won favor; Miss Stevenson as the scheming Princess Pretrousky excited favorable comment, while Miss Leclair, Mr. Loker, Mr. Hadfield and Mr. Gregory rounded out a cast that was especially well balanced.

The play was attractively mounted, and the uniforms of the officials, with the gowns of the ladies made a pretty stage picture. New vaudeville acts, being very popular, while McNaughton Bros., a Scotch singing and talking team, were warmly applauded. Hints for the Cook

Sugar Cookies.

One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, two eggs, quarter teaspoon mace. Cream all together, add two tablespoons milk, three scant cups flour, with two teaspoons baking powder and a pinch of salt. Roll thin and bake in moderate oven.

Lemon Turnovers.

One lemon rind and juice, one cup sugar, half cup currants, half cup chop-

Cheese Toast for Supper.

Cut slices of bread, place in pan and cover with thin slices of cheese. Sprinkle on a little salt and a bit of red pepper. Place in oven until cheese is melted.

Cookies for the Children.

Break two eggs into a cup and beat well, fill up the cup with cream or rich milk, sift together one and a half cups

Into a double boiler put 1 cup water, 2 cups milk, 1 cup rice (thoroughly washed) and 1 teaspoon salt. Cook until rice is soft. Put about 1-3 of this into a baking dish, then a layer of sliced cheese (or grated if dry), dots of butter, the more rice, cheese and butter. Then bread crumbs on top. Pour over it milk until it can be seen around the edge. Bake about 1-2 hour.
