Claims World's Record.

Chicago, May 13.—A world's pitching record was claimed on Thursday for Urban Faber of the Chicago Americans as a result of his performance in defeating the Washington club, 4 to 1, here on Wednesday.

According to baseball experts Faber pitched only 67 balls during the nine innings, five less than the record established by Christy Mathewson of several years ago. In the third and fifth innings Faber retired six men on six pitched balls, each batter hitting the first ball for an out.

Boxers Exonerated.

San Francisco, May 13.—Arthur Kaufman of Brooklyn, N. Y., national amateur champion middleweight boxer, and Matty Herbert, Arthur Nock and H. S. Fanger of New York and Arthur Sheridan of Boston, all boxers who appeared last week at the Panama-Pacific exposition, amateur boxing championship tournament, expressed satisfaction on Thursday over being exonerated of charges of professionalism upon which they were summoned to appear before officials of the Panama-Pacific Athletic association.

An unofficial charge had been made that the five men had made a demand for money for their appearance at a club boxing exhibition here. At the investigation it developed that the boxers had been requested to remain until Friday night to participate in a boxing tournament and that they had asked only for expense money for the extra time they would have to remain. The boxers maintain their amateur standing.

Carpenter Now An Aviator.

London, May 14.—Georges Carpenter, heavy-weight champion of Europe, has proved one of the handy men of the French army. After spending a long time in the trenches Carpenter took up the exciting role of dispatch rider. His next work was as a chauffeur to an officer of the aviation corps and now he has succumbed to the fascination of flying. Georges recently obtained his pilot's certificate and is now attached to the aviation corps.

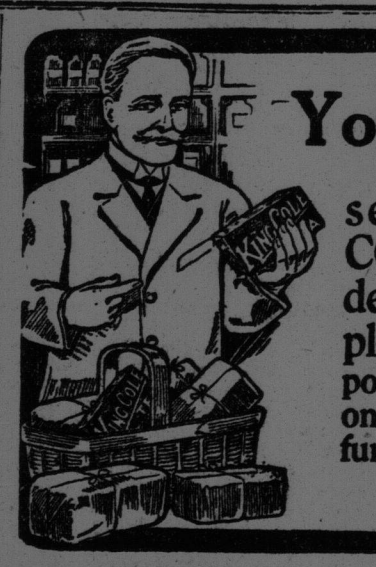
