NEW SEASON'S HOME RUN MARK FOR GAME IS MADE BY BROWNS

TEAM SECURES TOTAL OF FIVE CIRCUIT BLOWS

Ken Williams Leads Attack With Two-Pitcher Gets One

NEW YORK, April 26.—Major League bats were swung with a vengeance as the third week of the season opened, the St. Louis Browns scoring five homers in a single contest, the highest thus far this season.

Ken Williams, with an exceptionally good season already predicted for his powerful willow, opened his campaign with two four-base drives and others were made by McDonald, Rice and Zachary in an 11 to 5 victory for the Browns over Cleveland, which took the Indians out of the lead in the American League and gave the honor post to the New York Yankees.

This Speaker, who had been out of the lineup for a week, scored his second homer of the year, but it failed to stay the attack of the overhauling Browns, Zachary proving invincible in every inning, but the fourth, when his opponents scored four times.

CHAMPIONS LOST

At Washington there was another collection of safeties, with the Boston Red Sox the producers, and the champions went down, 8 to 6. Rosenthal, of Boston gave his team the lead in the seventh with a shot over the fence and the Sox added four scores in the ninth to make it safe.

Red Faber was again in good form for the White Sox and set back Detroit 4 to 2, allowing only five hits. Moutill drove out two doubles and a single, each hitting a run.

Ram Gray of the Athletics failed before the Yanks line of swatmen, 7 to 2, with Hoyt pitching expertly, allowing seven safeties. The Yankees gathered 12 hits off Gray.

FOOTBALL SEASON ENDS IN SCOTLAND

Queens Park Rangers' Win Over Haith Rovers is Feature

GLASGOW, April 25.—The Scottish football season closed on Saturday in glorious weather.

All games were well patronized, despite the fact that the matter of championship honors had been decided some time ago. However, there was still considerable interest attached at least to one game, the encounter staged at Kircaldy, where the Queens' Park Rangers played (and defeated) Haith Rovers. This game sealed the fate of the Kircaldy team. In order to have stayed in the first division they were required to win, but they did not do so, consequently they are relegated to the second string along with Clydebank. The result was two to one, but Raith's goal was a gift by Gillespie, of Queens' Park, who shot the ball into his own net. McDonald and Nicholson were the other scorers.

Notts County In Second Division

LONDON, April 25.—Saturday's league football, whose importance was somewhat overshadowed by the national tilt at Wembley Stadium, was productive of one definite result as far as the matter of relegation to the second division was concerned.

It decided the fate of Notts County, who, whatever else may happen to them, will at least join their fellow-townsmen, Notts Forest, in the second string next year. Notts Forest went down with Preston North End last season. The County failed at Sunderland yesterday, succumbing by two goals to one. It was Sunderland's final game of the 1925-26 season.

"WELCHERS" ON OHIO TRACK GET REFUNDS

Dissatisfied Losers at Pari-mutuels on Demand Receive Money Back Less 5%

GROVE CITY, Ohio, April 26.—Players of the ponies who lose and wish they had their money back can get it at Brinkley Park here. Because of State anti-betting laws, the buyer of a \$2 pari-mutuel ticket is a "contributor" and dissatisfied contributors can have their money refunded, less a fine for handling charges, they apply within a half hour after the race.

Newspaper men who tested the rule and received refunds pointed out a "poor loser" might "contribute" to each of seven races on the day's program and demand a refund. The money he lost, spending only the afternoon and 70 cents for handling charges, if he made poor selections every time. But on tickets of admission to the park the management refused to return the money and refuse entrance into the park and "This, it was considered, was a 'contribution' who gave evidence of chronic dissatisfaction.

State officials so far have not interfered with the operation of the machines under the refund rule.

Sanction Is Asked By New Ball League

Another meeting of the City and County Junior League was held over the week-end with A. Martin in the chair. The by-laws of the league were adopted and it was announced that the senior sanction had been applied for from W. E. Stirling, vice-president of the M. T. B. of the A. U. of C. The applications of several scorers and umpires for positions in the new league were considered but the final choice was postponed until the next meeting the latter part of this week.

Some discussion arose regarding whether or not a fourth team should be added to the league but it was finally decided to also postpone decision in this matter until the next meeting.

The Shamrocks, one of the teams in the league, will hold a meeting tonight to take up some important business in connection with the club's plans for the summer.

London Firm Saves Many "Grandmothers"

LONDON, April 26.—The English take their sports more seriously than any one else in the world, but they still depend on the classical excuses to get them off from work for a game or a race. Witness the following notice posted by a London financial house on the day of the Oxford-Cambridge boat race.

"Owing to the high mortality among grandmothers at the period of the Boat Race, the office will be closed on Saturday (race day), except for a nucleus staff drawn from those whose graveyards were occurred on the day of the England vs. Scotland football match."

BOSTON, April 26.—John C. Miller, 20-year-old winner of the Boston Marathon, was on his way to his home at Sydney Mines, N. S., after gaining new laurels here as a pulpit orator. He concluded his visit by delivering two sermons yesterday.

"There is no secret in this marathon game," he told his congregations. "You must think clean, live clean, obey the laws of nature and of God. You may fool the people for a time if you don't follow these rules, but you won't fool God, and if you don't live clean you will ultimately have to pay, both here in life and hereafter."

Four hundred admirers of the youthful champion thronged the station to bid him good-bye as he started his homeward journey.

CANADIAN TEAM REGAINS HONORS LOST BY RULING

Mercerburg Academy Is Other Winner of Twice Raced Event

PHILADELPHIA, April 25.—Despite what they considered to be an unjust ruling against them on Friday, Hamilton Collegiate relay team competed in yesterday's event in the Pennsylvania Relay Carnival, running to a fourth and fifth place.

The Canadians were cheered, however, by the announcement that officials of the meet, having taken their protest of Friday's quarter-mile under consideration, would award first place in that race to Hamilton as well as to Mercerburg Academy, who won the re-running in new world's record time.

TO GET DUPLICATE PRIZES

The two schools will receive duplicate winning prizes for the event, which was first won by Hamilton and then run over on complaint of false starts.

The Canadian sprinters did not show so well in Saturday's longer races, the mile and the two mile events. In the mile they finished behind Brooklyn Manual, Newton, New York and Kearny, New Jersey. Brooklyn Manual covered the distance in 8:27.4.

In the two miles Hamilton trailed New Utrecht, N. Y.; St. Benedict's, Newark, N. J.; Huntington, Boston, last year's winner, and Phillips, Exeter Academy, Otto Rosner, from Utrecht, covered the last half mile in 1:28.4-5, to break the tape 30 yards in the lead. The time for the race was 8:26.4-5.

LOCAL BOXERS AWAY TO BOXING TOURNEY

Art Garnett Takes Four N. B. Title Holders to Maritime Championships

Arthur Garnett, the well known local boxing enthusiast, left this morning for Halifax, taking with him Dan McAnulty, of the 126-pound class; Reg. Harper, 135 pounds; Harvey Lunney, 118 pounds, and 155 lb. Lee, 112 pounds. They will compete in the Maritime boxing championships in Halifax on Tuesday and Wednesday.

All these local boys recently won the titles in their respective classes at the N. B. championships, held in St. Peter's auditorium under the auspices of St. Peter's Holy Name Society.

Mr. Garnett, who, with Louis Donovan, former 126-pound Maritime champion, trained the boys for the provincial bouts, said last evening that he expected his protégés to come through in their classes at the Maritime tourney. They were all in good shape, he said, and should make excellent showings. Mr. Garnett is making his fourth trip to the sister city with boxers for various championships.
