

Famed as Mathematician

Ross, O. Nov. 6.—Cyrus B. Haldeman is considered one of the foremost mathematicians in the world. Scientists frequently seek his counsel. And his name stands out conspicuously at nearly every convention of mathematicians both in this country and abroad, though he does not attend any of them.

Yet Haldeman never attended college a day in his life.

Stranger still, his neighbors have heard little of the fame that has come to him.

They know him only as a mender of broken clocks and watches. That is his real vocation.

Algebra, geometry, trigonometry and calculus merely are side issues with him—just favorite pastimes.

But his knowledge in these subjects has made him a charter member of the Mathematical Association of America, the American Association for Advancement of Science and the Royal Society for the Encouragement of the Arts, Manufactures and Commerce in London.

He contributes regularly to mathematical publications. His analyses of difficult problems are cited frequently in text books.

A bachelor, Haldeman lives alone in a little cottage in the village of Venice, near here. All his 75 years have been spent there.

Ross began making mathematics his hobby while in school in the old Presbyterian church in his home town.

"I made up my mind to do something worth while," he says, "and picked out mathematics because I felt fitted for it. And I've been at it ever since."

CRIMINAL CASES IN NORTHUMBERLAND

Newcastle, Nov. 5.—In the Northumberland Circuit Court, Chief Justice Barry presiding, the following criminal case was before the court: King vs. Benjamin Deroche, Nancy Thibideau, on a statutory charge. The grand jury brought in a true bill. James Friel, K. C., of Montreal, and T. H. Whalen appeared for the Crown and J. A. Creaghan for Deroche, and J. A. Barry for Mrs. Thibideau. The petit jury found the two prisoners not guilty.

In the case of the King vs. Albert S. Miller and Frank Barry, charged with breaking and entering and stealing \$800 worth of fishing nets, the two prisoners pleaded guilty and were sentenced to three years' imprisonment in Dorchester penitentiary. In the case of the King vs. Dalton, for assault, the grand jury brought in no bill.
