Young's Pitching Feats Supreme

Most baseball records are made to be broken. Some stand the test of time longer than others, but eventually they go into the discard.

Until the coming of Ty Cobb, the batting records were held by any number of veteran stars. Then the irrepressible Cobb arrived on the scene, and slowly but surely he has broken practically every worthwhile record from a batting standpoint.

It is a certainty that most of Cobb's records will stand during the present generation of baseball fans, since some of them can only be equalled by a length of service in the majors such as Cobb has enjoyed. Few players are so fortunate as Cobb in that respect.

Yet one record made by Cobb that I expected to see stand for years was broken in 1922. During the season of 1911, Cobb set an American League record by batting safely in 40 consecutive games, within four games of the mark set by Willie Keeler in 1897. Season before last George Sisler hit safely in 41 straight games, smashing Cobb's American League record.

Back in 1899 Ed Delahanty, then with the Philadelphia Nationals, made 56 two-base hits in a season. For 24 years that record stood the test, despite the fact that many of the leading sluggers threatened it. Then along came Tris Speaker in 1923 with 59 two-base hits. Ed Delahanty's feat went "blowey."

Baseball records, it seems, are merely made to be broken except those established by that grand old pitcher, Cy Young. The way the modern pitchers are being slammed about, it looks very much as if the feats of Cy Young will go down in baseball records forever and anon.

In the matter of games won during his major league career covering a period of 22 years, Young has broken the 500 mark in victories. Winning 500 ball games in the majors is one baseball feat that I believe will stand the test of time.

In the first place it is a rarity for pitchers to stick in the big show for 22 years. Cy Young was a decided exception in this respect. In addition recent changes in baseball have imposed several handicaps on the pitcher that hurt particularly the lively ball. No pitcher is now even close to Young's record. Walter Johnson and Grover Cleveland Alexander have a chance, but it is a mighty slim one.

Under the pitching rules that now govern the game, Cy Young stands as the only pitcher who has pitched three years in the National League, the other two in the American. In one of these games not a batsman reached first base.

Three no-hit games in the majors is something for the modern day pitchers to shoot at. It is some trick to turn, but in no way compares with the task of winning 500 games.

True most baseball records are made to be broken, but it seems as if the feats of Cy Young are to stand for all time as supreme.

PITCHING POINTERS

One of the Greatest Pitchers of All Time

Always get properly warmed up when you are scheduled to pitch. Do not warm up in a haphazard fashion. Work for control, just as if you were pitching to some batter and knew his weakness.

Make it a point to see that you always do your preliminary pitching at the proper distance. In the major leagues this feature is attended to. The proper distance should be marked off for the amateurs.

Do not waste time experimenting with weak deliveries. Usually they are very hard on the arm, difficult to control and often throw a pitcher off his stride.

Speed, curves and a change of pace are the three necessary assets of a successful pitcher. Some have more speed than others. However, of all control is by far more essential.

No matter how much stuff you may have on the ball it avails you nothing if you are not able to get it over. Bases on balls are invariably costly. It seems as if they always result in runs being scored.

Don't fuss with your team-mates when they make an error. None feels worse about a misplay than the man who makes it. Criticism from the pitcher simply tends to further upset him.

Give your best efforts at all times, regardless of the score or the support that is being given you. Baseball is the most uncertain game in the world; it is the fellow who keeps plugging that respects the pitcher. Study your batters carefully. A majority of batsmen have a weak spot, a certain style ball that bothers them. Feed them that ball at the weak spot.

Know as much about the batters as you do. Exchange views with him prior to during the game as to what is best to pitch, particularly in the pinch.

Don't argue with the umpire. He is calling them as he sees them and usually does a pretty good job. A pitcher is being given to umpire makes his job doubly tough.

Seattle, Jan. 24.—By winning an overtime game here last night, with the locals losing on the prairies, Vancouver assumed the leadership of the Pacific Coast Hockey League, when they defeated Victoria 4 to 3.

PETER THE GREAT Sired 458 HORSES

Ninety-eight of His Offspring are Trotters in 2.10 List.

Peter the Great, 2:07 1/2, is now credited by turf statisticians as the sire of 458 horses with trotting records of 2:25 or faster. Some of these horses have made public records at both gait and are thus counted twice in this total of 458 performers. The number of individual performers is 573, or considerably more than twice as many as are credited to any other sire in the annals of harness racing. Allerton, 2:06 1/2, ranks second to Peter the Great, both as a sire of standard performers and as a sire of 2:20 trotters. His totals are 271 and 210, respectively.

When it comes to horses of 2:10 speed the great Peter's supremacy as a sire is yet more marked, his total being 188, as compared with 42 for the next best horse, General Watts, 2:08 3/4. Of these totals 98 of Peter the Great's represent trotters, while all but one of General Watts' fast ones are of the orthodox gait. Among the leading sires of 2:10 trotters San Francisco, 2:07 3/4, ranks third, with 28; Guy Axworthy, 2:08 3/4, fourth, with 27, and McKinney, 2:11 1/2, fifth, with 20. The other sires credited with a score or more, Dillon Axworthy and Belwin are the youngest sires in this exclusive company, each having been foaled in 1910.

Of the eight sires compiled in the list, all save Peter the Great are descendants of George Wilkes, 2:22, in the direct male line, and four of these trace back through his grandson, Axel, 2:12, while the other three include his grandson, McKinney; Belwin, the son of McKinney, and San Francisco, son of Tombo, 2:11, by McKinney.

THAW IMPERILS OLYMPIC SPORTS

Chamonix, France, Jan. 24.—A thaw with heavy rains, the most dreaded competitor of the athletes who are gathering for the winter sport programme of the Olympic games, has arrived at Chamonix.

The competitions are only a few days off, however, and a single night of frost will make good all the damage. Meanwhile any one suspected of being versed in weather lore is anxiously consulted as to whether he thinks the full moon will bring back winter.
