FLOOD LOSSES RUN INTO THE MILLIONS

ONLY ONE VERDICT AT DUAL INQUEST

Coroner's Jury Do Not Attach Blame in Connection With Thos. Palmer's Death—Hearing In- to Death of Mrs. Silas McDiarmid to be Resumed Tonight.

Coroner H. A. Porter presided over two inquests in the Germain street court building yesterday and the jury in both cases was comprised of the following:—R. H. Irvine, John M. Bates, Joseph Gilbert, J. H. D. Turner, W. H. Winchester, B. C. Carson and R. O. Heas.

The hearing into the death of Mrs. Silas McDiarmid, who died on her way to the hospital after being struck by New Brunswick Power Company truck at the foot of King street, was taken up first and was adjourned until tonight at 7:30 o'clock. G. H. V. Belyea, K. C., and K. A. Wilson appeared for the relatives of Mrs. McDiarmid. Thirteen witnesses gave evidence as to the accident. Dr. Harold Sharp, an inmate of the hospital staff, said that a very superficial examination of her condition had been made. N. L. Brennan said that he thought her collar-bones or shoulder blades had been broken as well as her face being injured.

The verdict in the case of the death of Thomas Palmer was that the deceased met his death as the result of a fall from a ladder in the old Corona factory and that no blame was attached to anyone. Robert Crawford represented the family. John Kenney, factory inspector, described the scene of the accident and Dr. Elizabeth H. Thurstott, of the General Public Hospital staff, described Mr. Palmer's condition. Five other witnesses were heard.

Up to last night Dominion income tax returns for 1922 totalled \$386,000 for this district. This is about \$36,000 less than was received by the same date last year.

Bridges Swept Away by Rising Waters—Woodstock and Rockville Dams Go—Bad Near the Border Towns—N. B. Telephone Co. Suffers.

Yesterday's sunshine was greeted with the greatest possible relief by thousands of people throughout the province as it pushed, for a time at least, the dark rainy clouds into the background, not however before the storm had left in its wake property damage which is placed well over \$1,000,000. Last night from various parts of the province, especially that section in the valleys of the St. John, St. Croix, Kennebecasis and their tributaries, came word of destruction and loss of property by the week-end floods, caused by the heavy rain and the subsequent melting of snow and ice in the woods and on the hills.

The centre, which suffered the most, is that in and about Woodstock and Milltown, where the dam of the Woodstock Light and Power Company was carried away with an approximate loss of \$5,000. The Imperial Packing building was also destroyed with 1,500,000 feet of logs of the Smith Lumber Company gone.

At Milltown the new weave shed of the Canadian Cottons, Ltd., was partially destroyed with a loss of \$200,000. One thousand feet of logs of Sorey & Company were lost at Hartland. A highway bridge was carried away at Jacksonville.

Reports from Fredericton say that the Marysville covered highway bridge was carried away while the Marysville steel highway bridge was shifted several feet by floating logs.

The dam at Rockville was reported last evening as having been carried away with a loss placed at \$25,000. The highway bridge at the depot at Welsford has been carried away with a like occurrence at Durham, Pennac and Barony, York county. At Blossfield a horse was swept off its feet and drowned, the driver being saved. At Donchester a half mile of the railway track is reported under water.

The international bridge over the St. Croix River between Upper Mills, N. B., and Baring, Me., was carried away last evening by the rush of water in the river. Work is being done on the Calais end of the St. Stephen bridge and traffic is reported suspended.

In the face of the floods the New Brunswick Telephone Company is struggling to keep up its service which was particularly hard hit in the western and northwestern sections of the province. In many places the service has been entirely cut off while in some others service is being retained at the greatest difficulty. The electric light station at Woodstock was closed down last evening owing to the flooding of the power plant, consequently there was no current to operate the batteries in the telephone plant there.

Reports from Woodstock last night were that there was only enough current left to operate the batteries for a few hours. Similar reports were received of telephone headquarters from Fredericton and St. Stephen.

Today the Victorian Order of Nurses took up their new quarters in the two upper flats of the house at 108 Pines street, well known as the former residence of the late William M. Jarvis. Future meetings of the board will be held in the Health Centre.

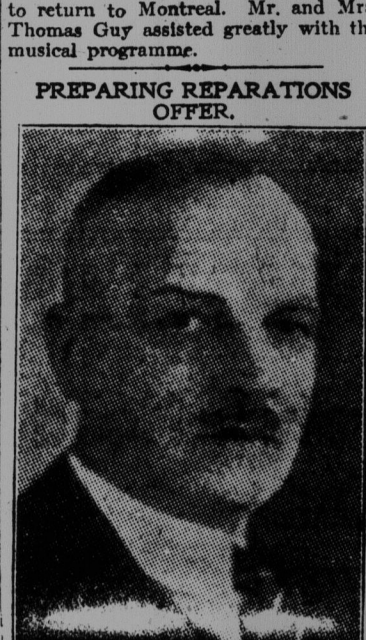
MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

IT'S ALL IN SILENT LETTERS.

There has been a lot of unnecessary conjecture about the pronunciation of Vilhjalmur Stefansson's first name.

Yet it is a very simple name to pronounce, this Vilhjalmur with which Mr. Stefansson's parents tagged him, and there is no reason why family circles should be broken up and hard feelings engendered in Toronto homes on account of it.
