RUSSIAN SCHOOLS SHARE IN GENERAL DISORGANIZATION

Commissar's Efforts to Preserve Them by Edict are Not Easy.

Petrograd, October 11—(By a staff correspondent of The Associated Press.) Russia's school system has suffered in the general breakdown of the economic system. Lunacharsky, the Commissar for Education, is endeavoring to correct and preserve the free schools by edicts, but it is a difficult task.

A great majority of the schools in the famine districts are not opening and it is extremely doubtful whether they can be opened this year. Even in the great cities like Moscow and Petrograd it is doubtful whether they can continue unless reorganization proceeds with great rapidity and energy.

In an effort to keep the schools going, parents have made contributions to teachers in the way of money and food and the children have often carried wood daily to the schools to keep warm. Books, paper, pencils and other supplies have been lacking.

Lunacharsky says in a recent statement that the Cheka, or Commission for the Prevention of Counter-Revolution, insists that the schools must be kept free of parental influence. To accomplish this he announces that the Government will name committees in each locality to take charge of the schools and will empower these committees to collect money from the parents who are able to pay.

Fade Disappearing. This step is in line with the general decentralization policy which the Government is endeavoring to carry out since it altered its economic policy and went back to domestic free trade. Fades which were introduced in many of the schools have largely disappeared. Many of the teachers were extremely idealists in the earlier days of the Soviet Government and endeavored to work many innovations.

The plan of having school children do all the janitor work in the schools resulted in such unsanitary conditions that it was abandoned in many places and harrowmen came back.

The schools were badly crowded. In Moscow most of the small children go to school from 9 until 3, and the older children go in the afternoon and remain until 9 p.m.

In an effort to piece out their inadequate salaries, teachers work in as many

The meals which the Government supplies to school children when food is available are prepared in central kitchens and carried by children in large vessels to the schools. Frequently the meals are late and the school schedule is irregular. The fear that non-Communists parents had at one time that the Government would endeavor to take their children away from them has apparently disappeared completely with the announcement of the new decentralization policy, or even before that was announced.

VICTORY FOR OPEN SHOP.

New York, Nov. 16—With milk distribution more than eighty per cent. of normal, more than 5,000 men taken on as permanent employees by the distributors, temporary injunctions obtained in New York and New Jersey against interference with deliveries and all efforts at amiable adjustment of differences abandoned, the strike of the milk drivers seems about to end in a victory for the open shop.

Mayor Hylan's effort to settle the strike by conferences between employers and employees, with Health Commissioner Copeland as mediator, has failed, the distributors having refused to yield an inch of ground. On the other hand, the strikers, through Dr. Copeland, made several important concessions in the hope that they would gain recognition for their union. Each proposal met a cold refusal.

ARREST GROWS OUT OF DEAL IN RARE VIOLINS

Dr. Sturcho's Bay Cremona for Which He Traded Guadagnini and Ruggeri is Cracked.

(New York Times.) Samuel Levitt, a salesman of 117 Louisa street, Brooklyn, was arrested at 1483 Broadway yesterday by Detectives Finn and Kenney, charged with being a fugitive from justice in Newark.

The complaint was Dr. Eugene Sturcho of 178 Mount Prospect avenue, Newark, who said that the salesman had swindled him for a trade involving several valuable violins.

He charges that in exchange for a G. B. Guadagnini violin valued at \$3,000, another of the same make priced at \$4,000, and three other violins, together with a mortgage for \$2,000, Levitt turned over a Joseph Guarnerius Cremona 1754, which the salesman held at \$15,000. Dr. Sturcho's complaint said that Levitt warranted this violin sound in every way, but that he had discovered a crack in the back of the instrument. The crack was carefully covered

up, he said, and became apparent only on close inspection.

Levitt, after his arrest, said that he would produce a certificate from W. B. Hill & Son of London certifying to the soundness of the Guarnerius. He declared that he made the transaction in good faith. Several of the instruments in question made their appearance at police headquarters, where Levitt was locked up, and Detective Finn, a talented performer, tested them for the identification of his uniformed comrades.

ANTIQUE MANSION.

(Sackville Tribune.) Situated about three miles from this town, in the district called West Sackville, stands a very ancient building. It was built over one hundred years ago by Hon. Judge Botsford for a country residence. When the Judge died, after having spent many happy years there, he left it to the government as a hos-pital for sailors. There was quite a large sea-port in Sackville at that time and many sailors were brought in sick with small-pox and other diseases.

Since 1870 the building has not been used for a hospital but different families have lived there.
