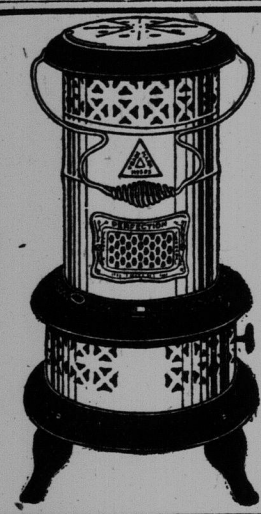

**LOCAL NEWS**

**BASKETBALL.**

In St. Rose's Basketball League last evening the Roses defeated the Emeralds, 14 to 12, in the junior section; and the Shamrocks defeated the Eagles, 38 to 23, in the intermediate section.

**NOT THIS MAN.**

**BANK CLEARINGS.**

Bank clearings here this week were \$2,788,540; last year, \$3,220,088; in 1919, \$3,437,561. The Halifax clearings this week were \$3,427,300. In Moncton they were \$519,875.

**THE VALLEY RAILWAY**

The people along the Valley Railway are anxious to know whether there is to be a special holiday service to enable them to get into town and back again without the delay caused by the present train schedule.

**ON INSPECTION TRIP.**

A. Price, general manager of the C. P. R. eastern lines, arrived in the city today in his private car, Lausantia, which was attached to the Montreal train. He is going through to Fredericton this afternoon on an inspection trip.

**INDOOR BASEBALL.**

The schedule of the Garrison Indoor Baseball League for the rest of this year is as follows: Dec. 16: 14th Field Ambulance vs. Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps; Dec. 20: 6th Siege Battery vs. C. A. S. C.; No. 6 Signal Company vs. C. Company Fusiliers.

**ABLE TO RETURN HOME**

Friends of Frank Staddon, who has been seriously ill in the General Public Hospital for some time, will be pleased to hear that he has recovered sufficiently to be moved to his home at 2 Barker street. He is going through to Fredericton this afternoon on an inspection trip.

**RED CROSS RELIEF.**

The question of relief was prominent at a meeting of the local Red Cross, held yesterday afternoon in the depot in Prince William street. Mrs. Alfred Morrissey was appointed business manager of the committee, and it was decided that this committee should meet once every week. It was pointed out that the most urgent requirements at present were men's boots and clothing.

**MRS. SARAH C. WRIGHT.**

The death of Mrs. Sarah C. Wright, widow of Horatio E. Wright, occurred at her home in Millstream, N. B., on December 10 after a lengthy illness. She was seventy-seven years old and died where she had lived for more than fifty years. She is survived by four sons and three daughters. The funeral was held from her late residence on Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock to the Baptist cemetery, and was attended by Rev. C. S. Young.

**FUEL OIL CARGO.**

Two records will be established by the steamer Sagittaria, when she arrives in St. John from Tampico, Fla., where she is now loading fuel oil for this port. She will be the first steamer to bring fuel oil in bulk to St. John and her cargo of 55,000 barrels will constitute the largest bulk cargo ever brought into the port. The oil will be placed in the new oil tank recently erected at Courtenay Bay by Allan G. McAvity and will be transferred to oil-burning steamers by means of barges. The C. P. O. S. Montcalm, due here in January, will be the first oil burner to take on fuel here.

**HYDRO OFFICIAL HERE.**

D. Shepherd of Toronto, a member of the firm of C. H. & P. H. Mitchell, consulting engineers on the hydro-electric development in the province, is here this morning on an inspection trip. Mr. Shepherd said that the development in Upper Canada was assuming immense proportions. In the Chippewa development work it was expected that water would be turned into the big canal this month, and the first unit, developing some 200,000 horsepower, would be installed so in time in January. This development will aggregate about 400,000 horsepower when completed.

**CLIPPER SHIP DAYS.**

A reminder of the old days in which St. John used to be a shipbuilding centre of world-wide note, in the form of a scale model—one-half inch to a foot—of a full-rigged ship, Britain's Queen, has a prominent place in the window of F. E. Holman's store in King street. It was formerly in the museum of the Mechanics' Institute whence it was taken to the Natural History Society Museum. The best modelled is thought to have been built between 1837 and 1845 and would be between 800 and 900 tons register. The model is complete, including the masts, boats carried and the figurehead at the bow. It has been in "drydock" for repairs for a few days and will be returned in the near future to the Natural History Society Museum.

**POLICE COURT.**

One man, charged with being drunk, pleaded guilty and was remanded after being warned that he could be fined \$5 for the drunkenness, \$50 for drinking in the street, and \$200 for taking liquor from a stranger. The magistrate told him ten months was the equivalent of the fines. Elizabeth Poirer, charged with the theft of \$202 from Mrs. Robert McAdam, pleaded not guilty and was remanded. She was brought from St. George last night by Police Matron Ross. The girl's mother, Mrs. Mary Poirer, was arrested on a like charge a few days ago and it is alleged that they acted together in stealing the money while working for Mrs. McAdam about two weeks ago.

**Freight Rates Exchange.**

Ottawa, Dec. 15.—In accordance with the judgment and order of the Board of Railway Commissioners issued January 14, 1921, the rate of exchange in connection with shipments of freight between points in Canada and the United States from December 15 to December 31, inclusive, will be 8 1/2 per cent, and the surcharge on the said traffic will be five per cent. The rate of surcharge on international passenger business will be based on nine per cent. exchange.

**Dennis Offers Prizes.**

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 15.—W. H. Dennis, of the Halifax Herald, has offered \$300 to Dalhousie University for prizes of \$300 each for the best prose or verse contribution to be known as the Joseph Howe Prize and an essay to be known as the James de Mille English Essay Prize.

**FIRST TO WED IN  
THE NEW CHURCH**

Marriage of Miss F. G. Haslett and James E. McAllister This Afternoon.

Miss Florence Golding Haslett, daughter of A. Hartley Haslett, and James E. McAllister, assistant superintendent of the Canada Steamship Line, were united in marriage this afternoon in Victoria street Baptist church by Rev. G. H. Hudson. They have the honor of being the first to be married in the new church. The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a very pretty tailored suit of brown velvet with beaver trimmings and hat to match, and carried a bridal bouquet of roses. She was attended by her sister, who wore a midnight blue silk dress with hat to match, and a corsage bouquet of roses. The groom was supported by his brother George. Following the ceremony a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents, 26 Clarendon street, after which Mr. and Mrs. McAllister left on a honeymoon trip to Boston and New York. On their return they will reside in this city during the winter months and will then move to Montreal. They were the recipients of a large number of presents, which included a chest of silver from the manager and members of the staff of the Bank of Montreal branch, Union street, where the bride was employed.

**CUBANS LIKE THE  
NEW SERVICE**

See Success for Venture Inaugurated by Sailing of the Sicilian from St. John.

A despatch from Havana says that great interest is shown there in the service inaugurated by the S. Sicilian of the Canadian Pacific Steamships, Ltd., which sailed for Cuba from St. John a few days ago. It says the success of the service seems already assured, for it is expected that not only will travelers to and from Canada benefit by direct passenger service of Canadian Pacific standard, but that Canadian exporters will derive the freight facilities of particular value owing to the certainty of regular sailing schedules.

The intention of availing themselves of this opportunity to go to Canada to see the Canadian markets personally. It is hoped that in the near future arrangements will be made to terminate or connect this new Canadian Pacific service with Mexican ports, which are becoming of very definite importance to both Cuba and Canada. The Sicilian will sail from Havana on December 17, and will reach St. John about December 28.

**WAS GOOD CATTLE  
SHOW AT AMHERST**

H. A. Porter Speaks of Winter Fair and Revision of Railway Rates.

"An exceptionally good cattle show," was the way H. A. Porter, secretary of the St. John Exhibition Association, expressed it when asked his opinion of the Amherst Winter Fair, from which he returned last evening. Mr. Porter said that the people of Amherst had materially aided the show people by providing additional attractions such as music, concerts, etc. New Brunswick, he said, was well represented with some fine exhibits.

John Miller, Jr., who made his debut to the maritime provinces at the 1921 St. John Fair, had his herd of Shorthorn at Amherst and repeated his performance of taking the bulk of the prize money. Mr. Miller has disposed of several of his best cattle to breeders in the maritime provinces and in Mr. Porter's opinion the stock men of the lower provinces have benefited much by Mr. Miller's visits.

Like the fall shows, the attendance would not so good as it might have been. Mr. Porter thought that a revision of the railway rates was necessary before the people could take advantage of the education offered through these shows. The fair was honored by the presence of several visitors from the upper provinces, including C. M. MacRae, assistant commissioner of the live stock branch, department of agriculture, and E. S. Archibald, head of the dominion experimental farms, both of Ottawa.

**MOTOR 'BUS LINE  
TO LILY LAKE**

City Hall Learns of it in Application Relative to Service.

There is the possibility of a motor bus service being inaugurated between the city and Lily Lake, so Commissioner Alcock, who is acting mayor, said today. He said that he had an application from a local man to commence the service, provided arrangements could be made with the city regarding operation under the motor traffic by-laws. The applicant expressed the opinion that, under the circumstances, he should not be held to a definite schedule as demanded by the by-laws, particularly as the service would not be in competition with any other carried. It is likely that no action will be taken until the return of Mayor Schofield to the city.

**ASKED TO WATCH  
FOR BOY WITH A  
STOLEN HORSE**

The theft of a mare with sleigh and harness has been reported to the detective office of the city of Oak Point. Walter T. McGarvey of Cincinnati, was re-elected secretary. Harry Jennings of Toronto, was chosen vice-president for Canada.
