Toronto, Jan. 2.—Frank Barreau, the Canadian boxer, continued his winning streak at the expense of Jack Perry, of Buffalo, here today, winning the decision after ten strenuous rounds. After solving the crouching attack of the former Pittsburgh fighter, Barreau had the best of the fighting.

FIGHT POSTPONED.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 3.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion boxer, will meet Pinky Mitchell, Milwaukee, on Monday night, Jan. 3, in a ten-round decision bout instead of this afternoon as originally arranged. The postponement being occasioned by a muscular affliction suffered by Mitchell. Leonard went through the formality of weighing in this afternoon, tipping the beam at 137½ pounds.

HOUSE SOLD OUT; NO FIGHT.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 3.—Benny Leonard, whose scheduled contest with Pinky Mitchell fell through yesterday when the latter reported an attack of neuritis in his left shoulder, will meet Johnny Dundee here on Jan. 12. The house had been sold out, the receipts totalling approximately \$40,000, when at weighing-in time the local boy's illness unexpectedly was reported.

Leonard expressed himself as anxious to box. He offered to meet anyone the promoters might select, but the state boxing commission would not sanction a substitute bout. He refused to claim Mitchell's \$1,000 appearance forfeit, or to accept expenses from the promoter. Mitchell's condition is not regarded as serious.

WARNING TO AIRMEN.

(Brooklyn Eagle.)
An airman who drops a lighted pipe from his plane is responsible for any damage his pipe may cause. This was decided at a moot or discussion in Gray's Inn hall, London, recently, at which Justice Darling presided.

Mr. Justice Darling, in the course of his judgment, said that for an airman to take a lighted pipe and smoke it when flying at a point where if it fell it would fall by gravitation to the earth instead of to the moon, to allow it to fall or not to prevent it from falling—that was in itself prima facie negligence. If the pipe fell to earth and set fire to a haystack or did any other damage, the person injured was entitled to an action to recover damages for negligence.

WHY BREAK WITH THE A. A. U. OF C?

Useless for Maritimes to Make Such a Move Unless Taking British Rules.

(Frederick Glenner.)
Suggestions emanating from Halifax that a Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association should be formed as a result of situation growing out of the suspension of the "unlucky thirteen" Nova Scotia athletes.

Readers have been sent out to sporting writers and others prominent in sports matters throughout the maritime provinces on the suggestion, which means in plain words that the maritime provinces should break away from the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada and form an association of their own.

Why such steps should be suggested merely because a dozen or so hockey players have been sent under suspension from the City Council Board. The secretary of the club, R. J. Adams, read before the Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association a paper in which he set forth the reasons for his suggestion. The paper was well received and the association adopted the suggestion.

Forming a Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association divorced from the A. A. U. of C. will not better the position of amateur sport in the maritime provinces unless a further step is taken and the new association adopts the British definition of an amateur, which would not end to the present dishonesty and camouflage and scandals that have periodically disgraced the amateur sports history under the present restrictions.

The answer to this contention is that the British A. A. U. which has the most wide open definition in the world, and the cleanest sport to be found anywhere, also works under an agreement with the A. A. U. under which the British athletes are able to participate in international competition with the amateurs of both the United States and Canada.

The suggestion has yet to be made by me that President Covey is not making an honest effort to properly carry out the duties of his present thankless and at the same time important position. The complaint is that he is working under impractical and unsatisfactory regulations, and that what he has been doing and has done in this case is all right except that it has not gone far enough. Why there should be delay in allowing the "unlucky thirteen" an opportunity to carry out their promise to establish their innocence is the only feature upon which President Covey can possibly be blamed.
