## ONE-MAN CAR ONLY MEANS OF KEEPING DOWN FARES, SAYS DON. M. CAMPBELL

Declares He Has Looked Carefully Over Reconstructed Cars in St. John and That They Are Exceptionally Safe and Should Be Easy to Operate.

Among the visitors to the city recently was Don M. Campbell, mechanical engineer, formerly superintendent of the Ottawa Car Company, and later general manager of the Preston Car & Coach Company, Preston, Ont., who has spent thirty-eight years in practical car building. He is the dean of the Canadian car builders, now acting consulting engineer for the Ontario railway and municipal board and railway equipment. He is the only one of his kind in the management and the workmen of the New Brunswick Power Company, said that from his observation and examination of the proposed car, as well as the rolling stock, he would like to sell new cars to the local company, but considered the reconstructed cars perfectly satisfactory safety cars, superior in many respects to the cars used in larger cities than St. John, or the Birney car.

"I have looked carefully over the reconstructed cars here," he said, "and they seem to be even better than cars of the same type in Calgary, Moose Jaw and other western cities; they are larger, the two doors for entering and leaving make them exceptionally safe and easy to operate. On account of the motor being so close to the entrance and exit doors, he has entire oversight of the passengers' movements, and consequently the danger of passengers getting on or off after the car starts is entirely eliminated. ## FINE ADDRESS BY JAPANESE AT CHAUTAUQUA

M. T. Yamamoto of Tokio, Japan, arrived in the city from Halifax this morning and spoke at Chautauqua this afternoon to a large audience, who listened with profound interest. Mr. Yamamoto dealt first with the mutual ignorance existing between Japan and Canada that creates needless doubt and fear and hinders proper international relationship and he urged that this ignorance should be dispelled and Japan and Canada be brought into a deeper knowledge of each other in spirit and character, hopes and ambitions. In speaking of militarism in Japan the speaker said it would be impossible for a country as small as Japan to maintain a large army and navy which would be capable of making her a country of any great military power. He said Japan would be only too willing to reduce her military power if Europe would set the example. The question of democracy was discussed and the speaker said that the goal of democracy can be reached, and militarism overcome only when a nation keeps its society in order and educates the rising generation. He says it is not the ambition of Japan to become a world power, as the Japanese people are not warlike, but it is the hope of Japan to win over that country, not by force but by love and respect. In speaking of the Shantung question the speaker said Japan could not afford to have China as an enemy, from an industrial progress point of view and much more so from a world peace standpoint. He said Japan has kept her promises with other nations and that positively does not regard an international agreement as a mere scrap of paper. Japan is ready to restore Shantung whenever China is ready to take up negotiations. In talking of the Anglo-Japanese alliance, Mr. Yamamoto said that the fundamental principles of Japan's foreign policy have been upon this strong alliance and the belief of his people that peace in the Far East can best be maintained by the working together with Great Britain. He mentioned the way in which Great Britain and it was because of this great alliance Japan declared war on Germany on August 23, 1914. He gave the entire credit of the organization of the alliance to Great Britain, recognizing Japan as a new power worthy of their confidence and co-operation. He said the alliance is not opposed to the United States and in 1902 when it was signed the United States was the first to endorse it. Mr. Yamamoto will leave for Fredericton this evening and will address an audience there tomorrow.

Rumor in London

London, Aug. 5.—Soviet Russia concluded a secret treaty with Germany concerning Poland a few weeks before the great Polish offensive began, says a correspondent of the London Times. He claims he has secured the information from excellent authority.

The treaty, it is asserted, contained the following clauses:—"Russia, without interference from Germany, would be allowed to appropriate all of Poland's arms, munitions, rolling stock and foodstuffs."

After the conquest of Poland, permission would be given Russia to send a number of Bolshevik commissaries to that country to control the export of Polish supplies of all kinds.

"Russia would then undertake to completely evacuate Poland in favor of the Germans, which would hold the country as a guarantee against future credits to Russia in return for German goods and German labor."

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## IN THE MARKETS

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Threatenings of war between the Allies and Russia with consequent prospective increased demands for United States foodstuffs had a bullish effect today on grain, especially wheat.

New setbacks in foreign exchange, however, tended to make the British Royal Commission was still holding off as a buyer. Pitt trading in future deliveries here was only of moderate volume, heavy margins being quoted owing to recent wild fluctuations.
