SONGS FROM OVERSEAS

To the Editor of The Times:—
Sir: In the course of the last few years I have had the pleasure of publishing a number of volumes of verse by poets whose inspiration is drawn from their experience of the wild and remote life on the distant frontiers of civilization. Among the most notable of these volumes have been *Songs of a Scotchman* and *Ballads of a Cheshako* by the young Canadian poet, Robert W. Service; *Songs of Nigeria* by "Adam" (E. C. Adams); *South Africa and Other Poems* by Vine Hall; *Songs Out of Exile* (Rhodesian Rhymes) by Colin Gubbins; and, from outside the British Empire, the *Cowboy Songs*, collected by John A. Lomas in the Wild West. I have now determined to issue these works in uniform volumes, as the nucleus of a series called "Songs from Overseas." But I do not intend to confine the series to these volumes. Inclusion in such a series will keep the names of already well-known authors before the public to whom they most appeal, and serve as the most effective medium of introduction for poets hitherto unknown.

With this end in view I appeal to all writers of English verse in every part of the world to send me their work, whether in MS. or already published outside the United Kingdom, with a view to publication.

I should like to add that I am at all times delighted to consider manuscripts of all kinds from fiction to memoirs or books of travel or records of the ordinary routine of everyday life in distant places, which are of interest to English readers. FIGHT TO ABOLISH BAR FEATURE IN THIS ELECTION

(Montreal Herald.)
There is an election in progress in East Middlesex for the Ontario Provincial Assembly in which the question of the abolition of the barroom plays an important part. The government and opposition candidates are in opposing camps on the subject. The election of Mr. Neely, the government candidate, would mean that the barrooms would be continued under the conditions laid down for their preservation by the Ontario government, while the election of Mr. Sutherland, who represents the opposition, would give the barroom notice to quit.

The election of Mr. Neely would be an expression of approval of the three-fifths clause, as it is called, which saved all the barrooms now open in the riding. It is claimed that the license commissioners of the riding, officials of the Whitney government, this year renewed a proportion of the licenses which those in sympathy with temperance principles desired to see cut off. The issue seems to be very clearly drawn. Mr. Neely has the support of the liquor interests, and, if elected, will fight against the abolition of the bar. On the other hand, Mr. Sutherland, if elected, will go to the legislature as a supporter of the policy of the Liberal leader in favor of the banishment of the bar. The result of the polls on Monday next will no doubt be interesting.

DEATH OF SENATOR BELL



The body will be conveyed to New Glasgow as soon as the sons from the west reach home.


