GREAT PEACE QUESTION NOT YET SETTLED

No Agreement as to Sovereignty of Italy in Tripolitan Provinces

Other Matters Are Secondary—Apprehension Over Balkan Matters Aroused in Constantinople by Decision for Army Manoeuvres

London, Sept. 26—The Times' special correspondent at Ouchy, Switzerland, reports that the modified Turkish-Italian peace negotiations are going on, telegraphed under yesterday's date.

The negotiations are being conducted in the strictest secrecy. The long reports in the Paris Temps and other newspapers purporting to give the basis of an agreement are pure inventions. The semi-official purporters have been proceeding quickly and unintermittently and have never been any deadlocked, but the principal question, namely Italy's sovereignty over the Tripolitan provinces, has not yet been settled.

Paris, Sept. 26—A great diminution in the gold and silver reserves will be shown in today's report of the Bank of France. The gold on hand has been reduced by \$1,700,000 as compared with the last report.

ALBERTA PEOPLE FEAR THEY WILL NOT GET THEIR GRAIN OUT

Crop is 25,000,000 Bushels and Prospects are for Movement of Only Third Before Navigation Ends

Calgary, Alta., Sept. 26—The prospective wheat crop of Alberta, this year, is estimated at about 25,000,000 bushels. The prospective amount shipped out of the province before the close of navigation will be less than 8,000,000 bushels or one-third of the crop.

SIR DONALD WANTS A CANADIAN NAVY AND BUILT AT HOME
