**To Keep Silver Bright**

All household silver needs careful attention, and to keep it in good condition, housewives must sacrifice considerable time. When teaching an inexperienced maid her duties in the household, a mistress should especially stipulate that the silver should be cleaned at least once a week, and that a list of all the pieces should be kept on a book in the pantry. After the thorough cleaning of all the pieces they should be counted and checked off with the list on the book. Under no conditions should any silver be allowed to remain out in the pantry at night, unless there is a special place for it. Each housewife usually has a method of her own in cleaning the silver. A good polish, free from all sorts of grit and dirt, is the best thing that can be used. This can be rubbed on with a soft cloth and the polishing done later with a chamois. Where ornate pieces are cleaned great care is necessary to get all the polish from the creases and crevices where it is most likely to lodge. Due solution to the problem of taking care of silverware when it is not in use has been effected. A cupboard is built under the pantry shelves and fitted with special lock and compartments made for the separate pieces. A shelf the length of the cupboard is placed a little higher than the center, thus leaving the lower portion for larger pieces. Both shelf and bottom are covered with thick red flannel and, if thoroughly brushed. The upper shelf is divided into box-like sections in which the small pieces can be easily. It requires less than five minutes to put away everything and no longer to take them out in the morning. Chamois is a good lining for drawers where silver is kept.

Auto Records Go.

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 12.—The New York boy who four years ago ran away from home to become a driver of a racing auto, today won the grand prize race, the blue ribbon event of auto contests. Not a great many years ago it was considered almost a disgrace to wear imitation seal, but these days it is more plentiful than fur and is now, like French imitations are trimmed with skunk to a great extent, which gives a pretty effect.

A very pretty gown can be made of light brown permo, which has a pin-point texture turned up at the knee in the wash-clothes style, and reaching up over the bust above a tucked girdle of olive brown chiffon over gold cloth.

The imported knitted garments from Paris are quite expensive, but any woman with a talent for knitting can produce satisfactory copies of the French models, providing she can obtain wools of the correct shades. This latter is the practical feature. The crown of the bonnet, sloping backward, offers no resistance to the wind, and the slanting brim fits well down over the hair and face. The bonnet can be of berry-red velvet, with a plaiting of the velvet around the edge and rosettes at the sides over the ears. A veil of pink chiffon cloth in two shades, one layer over the other, adds an attractive touch to the bonnet.

The fur bonnet is one of the newest ideas in costume togethery. This is like the hunter's cap, fitting well over the head and ears. The bonnet can be of dark gray heaver and trimmed with seal or ribbon in a strawberry-tint shade. Long streamers of the ribbon are tied under the chin. Rose and gray is a combination that is regarded as a fail-sized business structure, but can be worn with almost any motoring costume. The bonnet may be developed in gray heaver and olive-brown ribbon, brown beaver and rose ribbon, or other harmonious combinations.
