RESULTS FATALLY

Russell Rutherford, C. P. R. brakeman, Succumbs to His Injuries

Russell Rutherford, the young C. P. R. brakeman who was crushed between two cars at Fredericton Junction a few days ago, died in the General Public Hospital this morning at 5 o'clock. Ever since the accident he had suffered intense pain, and very little hope was held out for his recovery from his injuries. He was twenty-one years of age and had been in the employ of the C. P. R. for a couple of years. One day last week, while engaged uncoupling some freight cars at Fredericton Junction, he was crushed between the cars. After the accident he was put on board the van and hastened to this city. It was found that he was suffering from a fractured vertebra and it was not thought that he would live long.

He is survived by his stepfather, Frank Lingier, of Fairville; one sister, Miss Maud Rutherford, of Boston, who is now at home, and one half sister and one half brother.

The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon from his late home in Fairville, at 3.15 o'clock.

"BAPTIST DAY" PLANNED

Special Observance of June 25 is Being Arranged—St. John Churches' Part

The committee of arrangements of the Baptist World Alliance are making preparations to have June 25 of this year observed in places where there are Baptist churches, as "Baptist Day." It is probable that in the churches of the denomination in this city there will be special services. A minimum programme in being arranged by the World Alliance committee to be made up of hymns, recitations, addresses, etc., and it is planned to have the services as a nearly alike as possible.

It is thought probable that the matter will come before the meeting of the executive of the New Brunswick Baptist Mission board in May in this city, when the local part of the celebrations will be arranged.

The evening was pleasantly spent with sewing, games, and music and refreshments were served.
