NICE ART WORK DISCLOSED AS WALLS SCURED

Bishop Speaks of Renovation
of Cathedral, Now About
Finished.

St. Patrick's Day, Feast of St.
Joseph, Third Order St.
Francis.

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, in the Cathedral yesterday morning, referring to the fact that the cleaning of the walls had been about completed, said in the vestry, said he was sure the people must be well pleased with the change that had been brought about in the work of restoration. He made special mention of the Virgin's Chapel and particularly its ceiling which, he said, was not surpassed for beauty in all Canada. He asked the people to invite their friends to visit the Cathedral and especially note the beauty of the Virgin's Chapel.

The Cathedral painting was last done some 25 years ago and naturally in the intervening time the walls had become thickly coated with dust and accumulation from the furnaces. So much so was this the case that in some parts sacred designs on walls or ceilings had practically become obliterated. By many of the present generation of parishioners they had never been seen, while by most of those who were adults at the time that the work was first done they had been forgotten. Now these paintings and other decorative work stand out in striking manner because of the contrast with the appearance before the work of restoring was done.

St. Patrick's Day.
His Lordship made a special appeal to the generosity of the people in their giving to the St. Patrick's Day collection for the orphans. Many know that the offerings of the Catholic people at the masses in the St. John churches on Christmas Day and on St. Patrick's Day are always for this charity, as also are the receipts from the St. Patrick's Day dramatic performances and from the revenue from which the orphan girls at St. Vincent's and the boys at St. Patrick's Industrial School are cared for. Bishop LeBlanc said that the people had been generous in their support of the orphans but that there was a special need of their generosity in the collection of next Tuesday in the financing of this work, especially at the Silver Falls Institution.

In observance of the Feast of St. Patrick tomorrow high mass will be celebrated in the Cathedral at 10 o'clock. There will be a sermon appropriate to the day by Rev. Charles Boyd.

Feast of St. Joseph.
Next Thursday will be observed in the Catholic church as the Feast of St. Joseph. A novena in honor of this saint will conclude in the Cathedral on that day. Bishop LeBlanc's sermon on Sunday was on the exalted position St. Joseph occupied as the foster father of the Saviour.

Third Order of St. Francis.
The monthly meeting of the Third Order of St. Francis has been postponed from this week until March 25, when there will be a reception of new members. Bishop LeBlanc, in announcing this on Sunday, said he was much pleased with the way in which the people were joining in large numbers.

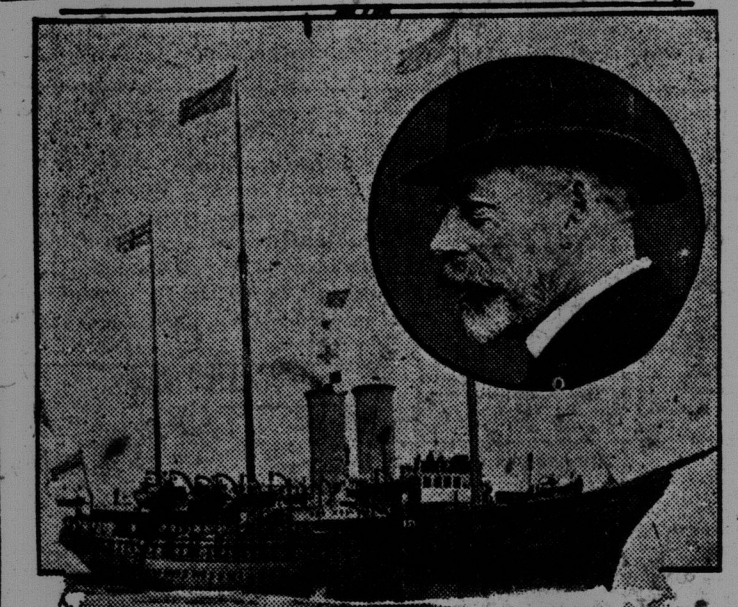

DISTRICT SCOUTS MEET IN ARMORY

For the first time the troop was able to carry out formation by hand signals and as these manoeuvres were going on the 40 leaders in attendance found their numbers look very small by comparison with the huge hall in which they had assembled. There was keen competition amongst the three sections.

Inspections.
P. Choppin, Scoutmaster for the troop, carried out the efficiency inspection and the second section made the best showing. Charades in which the leaders were asked to act out some scout law proved a specially entertaining feature of the programme and section three made the best showing for the charades.

Each section was then called upon

to send one of its members forward to give a short talk on any selected subject. Section one took all the honours in this event as it was represented by Patrol Leader Frank Murphy, whose address on the Boy Scout movement, its origin and progress, was judged the best.

Interesting games were enjoyed and first aid practice carried out. A decided increase in the number of Scout uniforms was noticed among those attending the District Troop meeting and it was remarked that the Scouts generally throughout the city have been taking great interest in procuring uniforms recently.

St. Jude's troop is now aiming at swimming honors. Under the leadership of its Scoutmaster, Harry Fowler, the troop attended the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday and their Scoutmaster gave them swimming instruction in the tank.

DAHLIA EXHIBIT PLANNED FOR FALL

Local Society to Present Matter to Saint John Exhibition Association.

A constitution and by-laws were adopted at the meeting of the Saint John Dahlia Society held on Saturday night in the Natural History Society rooms with Dr. H. J. Barton, president, in the chair, and a large attendance of members. About 80 people have applied for charter membership in the society and its aim is "More and Better Dahlias" for Saint John. The members believe that dahlias can be grown more successfully than any other flowers in Saint John and the society is hoping that it may be the means of extending and improving the culture of dahlias here, and having dahlias planted in the backyards and unused pieces of land throughout the city.

The meeting decided not to attempt a dahlia show this year as a separate venture but to ask the co-operation of the Saint John Exhibition Association in giving special attention to a larger section for dahlias and more comprehensive classification. A committee was appointed to meet the exhibition directors and present the matter before them.

Mr. Barton gave a very interesting talk on methods of dahlia culture and his audience was most helpful.
