MAKE TROUBLE IN MAN'S HOUSE AT 2 IN MORNING Edward May and Hilory Riley Are Sentenced in Police Court

MAY SAYS CALL IS ONE FOR REVENGE Go to David Jones' Home in Sydney Street and Arrest Follows

Found guilty of assaulting David Jones, his wife and three children about 2 o'clock this morning in their home at 6 Sydney street, Edward May was sentenced by Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning to a \$20 fine or two months in jail for each assault, the jail sentence to run consecutively, making a total of 100 or 10 months in jail. Hilory Riley, who was with May at the time of the assault, was sentenced to a month in jail for assaulting Jones and his wife and a fine of \$40 or four months in jail was imposed on him. Magistrate Henderson was severe in his condemnation of the actions of both men.

THE DEFENCE In their defence, the men claimed that Jones and another man staying there were the aggressors. May told His Honor that a reflection had been cast on his wife in Jones' house and he had gone there to avenge it. His Honor drew from this that May was the aggressor and that Riley was an accessory and then imposed his sentence.
