THE COMMON COUNCIL AND THE HARBOR.

The Common Council, at its meeting yesterday afternoon, made a beginning in the matter of harbor improvement by passing a number of resolutions involving the expenditure of considerable sums of money, and by declining to pass other resolutions in connection with the harbor.

In the first place the Common Council sat severely down on the scheme for a local commission which was moved by Mr. Robertson. The vote was quite decisive against that plan, and some of the opponents of harbor commission, and the idea will probably not be heard of again in the present Common Council at least.

On motion of Mr. Robertson the report of the harbor committee of November last in regard to Pettigrew's wharf was adopted, and the department of public works ordered to be instructed to call for tenders immediately for the performance of the work indicated in the report.

The report proposes to fill up the Pettigrew wharf, the property of the city, and build a wharf face on the line of the present corporation pier. This would add about 180 feet to the length of the corporation pier giving it a face of 750 feet of which 435 feet would be south of the wharf corner made by the stipidity of City Engineer Peters, and 315 feet north of it.

The Maitland now occupies 280 feet of this pier and there is room for a large vessel in front of her. The improvement suggested would leave room for two small steamers or one large one after the Maitland had been provided for. The estimate of cost is \$120,000 but this sum will probably be found to be much too small. When completed it will add hardly anything to the accommodation of the port, but it will give us a wharf long enough for any steamship to lie at that is likely to come here, provided a sufficient sum is expended in dredging. This wharf, however, has neither suitable warehouses nor railway connection and without both would be of little or no value.

A steam dredge was ordered to be purchased for use in the harbor, it being explained by Mr. Robertson that a dredge could be obtained for about \$5,000. If this can be done it is a great pity that our city fathers have not had the courage to invest in one long ago. However, "better late than never." We will not look too closely into the matter so long as the result is satisfactory.

The motion made by Mr. Robertson that the city shall pay the land damage sustained in carrying the railroad from the C. E. R. wharf to the corporation pier, through Charlotte and British streets was not agreed to, but an amendment was carried referring the matter back to the committee. What particular object is to be gained by this course we do not know. The committee have already supplied the Common Council with all the information they possess in regard to the matter. The situation is a very simple one. The government will build the railway at once, provided the city gives the right of way and becomes responsible for the damage done to private owners of property. It is for the city now to accept or reject this offer. The members for Sydney ward are violently opposed to the extension because they say it will injure British street and yield a crop of lawsuits. There is an evident feeling in the Council that the proposed railway extension, while well enough so far as it went, would only partially remedy the difficulty. It would give railway connection with Boole's Point and the New Pier, but our wharf accommodation for large steamships would be practically as limited as it is at present. On the other hand it is obvious that we must have more wharves, and if the addition to the C. E. R. pier extending to Boole's Point what is to be built, as recommended by Mr. Perley, the necessity for a railway through British street will cease for the C. E. R. pier will be carried direct from the C. E. R. pier to Boole's Point. This proposed wharf, which is estimated would cost \$250,000, will give us 1,400 feet of additional deep water frontage sufficient to accommodate four ocean steamships. Does the city propose to undertake the building of this costly wharf? Nothing less will satisfy the immediate requirements of our trade, yet many will be disposed to think the expenditure larger than the city can afford. Still if this wharf is not to be built, then the railway should be carried to the Corporation Pier as proposed by the Government.

The resolution of Mr. Stackhouse that the Dominion government be asked whether they intend to make such improvements and extensions at Boole's Point as will give sufficient accommodation for large ocean steamers, or on what terms they will transfer their frontage on the harbor to the corporation, will bring up at once the whole question of harbor improvement. Taken in connection with the resolution of Mr. Chesley for a committee to inquire into the subject of harbor improvements at the North End, it will give our citizens an opportunity of understanding clearly the fitness of a Common Council representing

three sections of one city, to carry on a comprehensive scheme of harbor improvement. If the South End is to have the Boole's Point extension, the North End will demand, and justly demand, the extension of the Long wharf, while the West side will claim that Sand Point wharf be extended. Where the city has to pay for harbor improvements and the citizens are taxed for the claims of each section must be considered. Therefore, if anything is to be done at all to improve the harbor, the work must be carried on in accordance with a comprehensive and well considered plan, which it will cost at least one million dollars to complete. The work done yesterday at the Common Council, although it involves an immediate expenditure of \$17,000, can only be regarded as preliminary, a sort of preparation for the large expenditures that will have to be made before St. John harbor is fit to become the winter port of Canada.

NORTH END SUPPLEMENT.

On Wednesday next THE GAZETTE will issue a special supplement devoted to the interests of the North End of the city of St. John. The importance of this addition to the territory of St. John has been largely overlooked by the people of this city.

In the North End are located the largest proportion of the handsome residences of this city, and many of its most important industries. Besides all this, the development of the North End in the past ten years has been much greater than that of any other portion of the city of St. John. And in this particular, history will repeat itself in the next ten years. It is, therefore, fitting that the people of St. John should better know and appreciate the value of the territory added to St. John by the act of Union.

NOTE AND COMMENT.

If Mr. Sexton is to be taken as an exponent of Irish opinion Mr. Ballou's proposal to establish and endorse a Roman Catholic university for Ireland, will not satisfy the Irish Home Rule party, although it will engage the men of Ulster and also many good Conservatives in England. Sexton says that no matter what remedial measures are passed the Irish people will not sever from the main object which is to obtain an Irish Parliament.

This is a highly probable story and might be accepted as true but for the inconvenient fact that the men now in custody are known to have been connected with the murder and also to be leading members of the Clan-na-gael society.

The St. Andrews Beacon says that the Gazette would have been nearer the truth if it had said that St. Andrews was 50 miles closer to Montreal than St. John. Our statement was that St. Andrews was nearer, which we think is correct. Mr. Adams, a common point, is 43 miles distant from St. Andrews and 84 miles distant from St. John station is about 82 miles, so that the difference in distance is 41 miles and not 50 as stated by our St. Andrews contemporary.

Charles Brodie, who died at Fredericton yesterday in a victim to cholera administered by medical men. There seems to be a great deal of ignorance among the doctors as to the proper administration of cholera, as well as in regard to the means to be used for the purpose of restoring a patient who seems likely to die from its effects.

If the proposed line from Moncton to Moncton strikes the Harvey-Salisbury line at Grand Lake, as stated by one of its promoters, it will leave St. John with 180 miles of an advantage over Halifax for through traffic over Canadian territory from Montreal or Quebec. This is almost double the advantage in distance we now have by the Intercolonial and ought to be sufficient to bring the business to us.

A Winnipeg paper states that eighty per cent of the French Half breed children in Manitoba can neither read nor write, although separate schools have been in operation for about twenty years. This is a bad showing for the separate schools of that Province, which are so envied to the taxpayers.

The silly Telegraph is very angry because the Dominion had a surplus of \$1,400,000 during the past fiscal year, and attacks the Ottawa Citizen for referring to it. It thinks it is making a point against the government when it states that in 1885-86 there was a deficit of \$5,834,772. The deficit that year, as every one knows, was due to the war in the North West, which was stirred up by Riel and other good Grits, so that the deficit was a Grit affair, for which law-abiding Conservatives were in no way responsible.

The Fredericton Observer disclaims all sympathy with those persons on the Miramichi who used dynamite for the purpose of killing salmon.
