Fire at Richmond - The dwelling house owned and occupied by Mr. David Walker, and known as the old Livingston homestead, was destroyed by fire on Friday morning. The building took fire on Thursday afternoon, but a number of neighbors assembled and extinguished the flames as soon as possible. The fire engine was brought to work and a large number of people worked hard to save the house and outbuildings. The house and outbuildings were totally destroyed. The loss will be about \$2,000; insurance, \$1,800. This house was built sixty years ago by the late Judge Weldon and was one of the finest houses in the county.

Refusing to Aid Officers.

When the arrests of the young men, McClintock and Bernard were being effected on Tuesday evening of last week the crowd present in upon the officers and rather encouraged the prisoners in their struggle to escape. These bystanders and interested spectators are generally in sympathy with offenders - there being a few exceptions of course - and their presence seems to have the effect of promoting resistance. In the case referred to it was especially noticeable that while the prisoner, Bernard was resisting officer Gillis, the crowd was so dense about them as to interfere with their movements. But when the officer was aided by several law-abiding citizens who exercise his authority for the preservation of the peace, and he called upon men in the crowd to assist the officers, those who had been brawling and apparently much interested in the fight, seemed to be the most anxious to get out of the way. It was, therefore, clear that those persons were there either out of curiosity that was not very creditable to them, or were only awaiting a favorable opportunity to assist the prisoner in making his escape. And it thus happened that of nearly a dozen persons called upon to assist only one or two responded, one on the roll of honor being Mr. Anthony Forrest, who rendered good service to the sheriff and police.

Filled to assist, Messrs. Andrew Casey, James Miller, Robert Allen, Joseph Mills, Michael Fitzpatrick and John Smith were before police magistrate Murray on Friday charged with refusing to assist the officers when called upon. In

the case of one it was quite clear that the failure to respond was due to the fact that he preferred to see the officers get the worst of it. One had gone so far as not only to refuse assistance when called upon, but to take Mr. Forrest by the collar and tauntingly his duty, and although he thus, proved his sympathy with the law breakers, rather than with decency and peace and order in the community, he endeavored to attribute his conduct to the illness, which, however, he failed to plead at the time. In the case of those who summed, those were extending circumstances, but not of sufficient weight to save them from being fined. In the case of John Smith it seemed clear that it was one of mistaken identity, so he was excused. One unwilling bystander had claimed that he was an American citizen and therefore exempt from responding, and it is only this person referred to by Mr. Smith being taken for him by the Sheriff. The citizens of all countries, while journeying in our communities, and therefore protection from our police and freedom of our streets, as the British subject and citizen, and our laws require that they, in common with citizens, shall reciprocate, by assisting to maintain law and order in the common interest, when called upon to do so.
