The "Order" for troops proceeding to Camp is "Marching Order," and this will be complied with as far as possible, but equipment of whatever kind in possession, must be issued to the men and brought to Camp.

Regimental Quartermasters will be required to be in Camp one clear day before the arrival of their corps, and one clear day after its departure, for the purpose of drawing and returning camp equipment. Pay will be allowed for those days, also an allowance for subsistence of one dollar per day.

Quartermasters failing to comply with this regulation will forfeit all pay and allowance.

Officers commanding corps will make arrangements for the men under their command bringing cooked rations with them to camp on the first day.

For this purpose an allowance in lieu of rations of 25 cents per officer and man in transit, together with 35 cents per horse in lieu of forage for the day of arrival in camp.
