PASSENGERS HURT IN PITTSBURG TRAIN WRECK

PITTSBURG, Jan. 26.—Train No. 44, the Pittsburg special from St. Louis on the Pan Handle Division of the Penna, was wrecked at 605 a.m. today between Gonesville and Trinway, 133 miles west of Pittsburg. Several passengers and G. B. McKeen, general manager of the Vandalia Lines, were injured, none of them seriously, it is
