### STRAWBERRY MARKET

#### JUMPING THIS WEEK

Prices Range All the Way From 16 to 31-2 Cents per Box—Big Shipment Expected Next Wednesday.

The local strawberry market has been cutting up this year in accordance with the usual habits of that uncertain commodity.

Last Saturday the berries were selling at 18 cents a box and as late as Tuesday the price held to 16 cents. Then came the deluge. On Wednesday every boat arriving at Indiantown carried immense quantities of the ripe red fruit. This was the first big consignment and it was so big that it flooded the market. At Indiantown the wholesale price ran about 5, 5 1/2, and 6 cents per box, and late in the day sales were recorded as low as 3 1/2 cents per box. In the city the berries were sold at from 8 to 9 cents.

On Thursday the prices continued fairly low, the fruit selling at 8 to 10 cents in the city and at 7 and 8 cents in the North End.

With the news of the low prices orders began to pour in on the grocers, and as another shipment as large as that of Wednesday was expected yesterday the dealers readily booked large orders at low prices. The berries arrived as usual, but for some reason which no one seemed to know, they brought among them, scarcely half a dozen packages of berries.

This resulted in a sudden increase in the wholesale price and many of the orders were left unfulfilled. The price will hold firm today, but those that are left over will be sold low tonight and on Monday. The berries will be no shipments to speak of on Monday and Tuesday, but on Wednesday another big shipment should arrive.

As this will be about the height of the season the prices will likely be about as low as they will go, and housewives who are planning preserving operations will want to get their orders in early.

### WEST SIDE FIRE STATION

#### WILL SOON BE ERECTED

Tenders for New Structure Closed Last Night—Many Bids Received.

The West Side will shortly be graced with a new engine house with all modern equipment. The building will be erected at the corner of Victoria and Queen streets. There will be sufficient accommodation for an engine, hose cart and hook and ladder wagon. The tenders for the contract closed last evening. A large batch have been received, including figures from a number of outside firms. It is expected that the awarding of the contract will be made within a few days.

### WILL START TODAY TO BUILD ABOUDEAU

#### Preparatory Work Has Progressed Satisfactorily

#### A Big Undertaking With Many Difficulties In the Way—To Employ More Men as the Work Proceeds.

An enormous work is being carried out at the Marsh Bridge. The construction of the aboudeau has caused great activity and daily there are a great number of visitors to witness the work. During the past few weeks splendid progress has been made. Clark & Adams, the contractors, are thoroughly satisfied with the way in which the work is proceeding.

The preparatory plans at the bridge are practically completed. Today the contractors will start in earnest at placing the concrete wall. There are a number of difficulties encountered on this job, but the workmen are surmounting them.

The flow of water from the creek is gradually being stopped. However, as a great depth there is as yet some water. Two pile drivers and a steam concrete mixer are constantly employed. The contractors are building a coffer dam and filling it with mud. It is necessary to make the dam of sufficient height to stand the high tides.

On the upper side of the bridge the piling has already been driven and excavations have been made permitting the work to proceed. There will be a great improvement as a result of the contract. The old fashioned Marsh Bridge aboudeau will be replaced by a thoroughly up-to-date one. A number of new sewers will have to be installed as the result of the changes made.

The workmen will reach a depth of twenty-eight feet. The dimensions of the wall in feet will be 20x28x28. The piling will be strongly placed on both sides.

J. A. Adams, of Clark & Adams, informed a Star reporter that as the work of placing the wall and general improvement proceed, employment would be found for more workmen. Everything is in readiness to start to erect the wall today.

### HIS EXPERIENCE GETTING INFORMATION

#### Judge McDonald is Convinced That Reports He Has Heard of St. John are Not Without Foundation.

His Honor Judge McDonald, of Charlottetown, came to the city last evening accompanying some friends who were en route to the United States, and returned home this afternoon. In conversation with the Star Judge McDonald said that at home he had frequently heard of the discourtesy with which strangers in St. John are sometimes treated by officers at the depot, and this morning he thought he would find out for himself whether such reports were well founded. He has no longer any doubt. Judge McDonald's experience, as he relates it, was enough to give an ordinary man a fit of the blues for a week. He was insulted when he asked information about his train, and after repeated efforts to secure the desired knowledge was told he could find what he wanted in the time-table.

In the Charlottetown Club there will now be one more affirmative voice when the vote is taken on the brusqueness of St. John officials, but before going home Judge McDonald will report to the J. C. R. Board of Management what he found here.

### WAR IN OUR MIDST THIS AFTERNOON

#### Civilian Soldiers of 62nd Regiment Will be Given Taste of Service Conditions in Annual Field Day Manoeuvres.

Considerable interest is being displayed in the 62nd Regiment's "field day" which will be held this afternoon. Ideal weather greets the soldiers and a lively few hours is anticipated.

Various tactics will take place on the barracks and at Fort Howe, of primary importance are the final manoeuvres.

The force will be divided, one part forming the attacking body and the other the defence. The manoeuvres will last in all about five hours.

Assembling at the Barracks Square plans will be made and orders given out. The regiment will form about 2 o'clock and headed by the 2nd band and drummers will start to Fort Howe. At points along the march, manoeuvres will be carried out. Lt. Colonel Edwards will command the march, with Major Perley second in command.

The "field day" commands but once in a year, and keen rivalry is being manifested by the different companies.

There has been some talk of the soldiers proceeding to Fairville to continue the manoeuvres, but this course quite unworkable.
