The present season in the big leagues is a great one for the youngsters. Almost every club has several men breaking in this year who have astonished the fans and the old timers with their proficiency in every department of the national game.

Speaker and Hooper, of the Red Sox are two newcomers who have proved stars of the first magnitude. Their speed and cleverness have made them the talk of the circuit, while to say that the home fans are delighted with their work is to put it mildly.

In fact, all the new men on the Boston team have shown themselves ready for any emergency. Gardner and French are most capable substitutes and their ability to close up gaps in the lineup when the regulars have been out on account of injuries has been one of the reasons why the team has been so successful.
