NEW PORTLAND CEMENT CO. ORGANIZED

Rapid City, S. D., Aug. 24.—Arrangements have been perfected through the efforts of C. C. Crabtree of this city for the organization next month of a Portland cement company at Rapid City, which will operate on extensive gypsum beds west of here. The company is to be capitalized at \$3,500,000. It will control 1180 acres and the plant will have a capacity of 4000 barrels a day. Owing to the nature of the limerock here, mining is easily accomplished in the gypsum industry, and the limerock is gravitated to the crushers. It is said that because of these things cement can be manufactured here fifteen cents a barrel cheaper than in other parts of the country.

WOMAN CONFESSED TO SMUGGLING Mrs. Alfred Dugrenier Of Lawrence, Mass., Admitted Making False Declaration After Interview. New York, August 23.—When Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Dugrenier, of Lawrence, Mass., arrived here today on the steamship Grosser Kurfurst, customs inspectors, after an examination of Mrs. Dugrenier's baggage declared that they found a number of dutiable articles which she had not included in her declaration. Their luggage was seized, and a hearing was under way when Mr. Dugrenier interrupted and asked permission to hold a fifteen-minute conference with his wife. Fifteen minutes later man and wife reappeared from an ante-room, the woman sobbing and supported on the arm of her husband. "I didn't tell the truth," she said, between sobs. This ended the hearing, and while no arrests were ordered the customs authorities seized a gold chain, three gold watches, three scarf pins and a gold pocket. Lawrence, Mass., August 23.—Alfred Dugrenier, who was held up by customs officials in New York, is one of the more prominent French residents of the city, and is a member of the firm of Dugrenier and La Chapelle, manufacturers of French wine and also contractors and builders.
