FISTIC RECORDS OF CHAMPION AND ADVERSARY

In the view of the fact that Champion Jack Johnson and Jim Flynn will battle for the heavyweight championship of the world in Wendover, Utah, on July 4th, the history of both men will be read with interest by the sporting public.

The champion entered this world on the 31st of March, 1878, in Galveston, Texas. He is 6 feet and 1-4 inches high, and weighs 195 pounds when in fighting trim. Up to the year 1901 there are no authentic records of his fights, but in that year he fought seven times scoring five victories, one draw, and was knocked out for the first and only time by Joe Choynski. This fight took place at Galveston, Texas, and lasted three rounds.

Jim Flynn, whose correct name is Andrew Chiariglioni, was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., on the 24th of December, 1879, and is of Italian-American extraction. The records of their fights are as follows:


