MONTHLY REPORT OF S. C. A.

Special Appeal for Maple Sugar to be Sent to New Brunswick Men Serving in France.

The regular monthly meeting of the Soldiers' Comfort Association was held Wednesday at 3 p. m., Mrs. Geo. McAvity presiding. The minutes of the previous and executive meetings were read, it is decided to hold the meeting for election of officers the second Wednesday in June when the annual reports of the various committees will be read. The S. C. A. was organized May 19th, 1915, and has tried to live up to its name and bring comfort to the men in the camp and trench. The report of the treasurer showed that \$5,482.70 had been received to date of this \$378.78 was contributed during April; expenses to date, \$5,069.97, leaving a balance on hand of \$144.43. The S. C. A. are dependent on the generosity of the public so it is hoped that cash donations to purchase yarn and comforts will be forthcoming during this month. Every membership fee of twenty-five cents helps to swell the funds. The corresponding secretary read an acknowledgment of a remittance from Miss Plummer dated April 10th of receipt of cases shipped March 3rd, everything in perfect condition. Also a letter from Captain Maurice Scovill, O. C. D. Company, 4th C. M. R., thanking the S. C. A. for two cases of socks received by him April 21st.

Women's Institute, Cody's.

The monthly meeting of the Cody branch of the New Brunswick Women's Institute, was held at the home of Mrs. A. Richardson, on Tuesday evening, May 2nd. Twelve members were present, including Mrs. Will Crawford, who spent the winter in England, where she went to be near her husband, Sergeant Will Crawford, who is now in the trenches "Some-where in France". After the business part of the meeting had been disposed with, the members were given a very fine and instructive address by Rev. C. C. Currie. The June meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. George Fisher. Meetings are held on the first Tuesday in each month.

I. O. D. E. Convention at Toronto.

St. John and New Brunswick chapters of the I. O. D. E. will be well represented at the convention of the chapters from coast to coast, which is to be held at Toronto on May 16, 17 and 18. About 200 delegates are expected, as it is to be one of the most important conventions in the history of the order. From St. John Mrs. E. A. Smith and Mrs. C. B. Allan, of the Royal Standard Chapter; Mrs. J. B. Travers, Brunswick Chapter; Mrs. A. W. Adams, De Monts Chapter; Mrs. G. McA. Blizard, Loyalist Chapter, will go, while the other chapters will be represented by one or other of the delegates from this city.

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The report of the wool committee, of which Mrs. Holly is convener,

shows a purchase of 650 lbs. of yarn at 80c. per lb., also the following returns: 763 pairs socks from association wool, 1,706 pairs donated. Total shipped, 2,469 pairs. During the month seven little girls on Douglas Avenue held a sale of cook-

ing and fancy work and realized the sum of \$65.00, which they gave to the S. C. A., to buy comforts; also the receipt from the pantry sale amounted to \$150.00.

Mrs. McAvity suggested that as this was the month when maple sugar was plentiful it would be in keeping to ask for donations from the public, any amount will be acceptable. Bring it in early so that our Canadians in France may know that we in New Brunswick never forget them. Reports from the various circles were read as follows: East St. John, West St. John, Harmony, Red, White and Blue, Girls' Association, Centenary Girls' Association, Brookville, Ingleside, Newcastle Bridge, all showing that the work is increasing. A new circle has been organized at Laurencetown, N. S. Cases of socks and comforts have been received during the month from Madam, Gasquet, Centerville, Hartland, Chipman, Campbellton, Mac's Bay, Moncton, Hampton, St. Stephens, all of which have been packed and consigned to Miss Plummer, Moore's Barracks, England. Let all help, who are living in safety and comfort at home must do our best.
