NUMBER OF CASES DEALT WITH IN POLICE COURT

Fred Galbraith Fined \$200 on Liquor Charge—Man Fined \$20 on Complaint of Fire Chief.

A large number of cases were dealt with in the afternoon session of the police court yesterday afternoon. The case against Fred Galbraith, charged with the importation of liquor into the province, was concluded and the defendant fined \$200.00. When finding Mr. Galbraith the magistrate stated that the next case that came up before him similar to the present one would be fined to the fullest extent of the law.

C. J. Bassen, charged with having paper and rubbish in his cellar at the corner of Sydney and Union streets, contrary to the city by-laws, was cautioned by the magistrate to have his place cleaned up. G. E. Blake, chief of the fire department testified that he found paper and ashes on the cellar floor and ashes in a wooden pan.

Herman Sivovits, who keeps a fruit store on Sydney street was in court charged with the same offence. Chief Blake testified that all kinds of rubbish and ashes were strewn around the cellar. Frank Purton, Chief Blake's driver corroborated his testimony after which the defendant was called to the stand. He admitted that his cellar was in the condition described. He stated that he opened a large number of boxes each week and the cellar and that the ashes, that the Chief referred to he used to fill up holes in the floor. He was fined \$20.00.

William Triston pleaded guilty to the charge of discharging a revolver in the house of Vezel Kramachy, Long wharf, and was fined \$50.00. Michael Sarchuk was acquitted.

WOULD NOT PERMIT FORMER EMPRESS TO QUIT RUSSIA

German Delegates Wanted Her and Some Other Relatives of Kaiser to Go to Germany.

Petrograd, Jan. 18.—Maxim Gorky's newspaper, Nevald Zhizn, asserts that the German delegates in Petrograd asked the representatives of the government commissioners to permit the former Empress and some other members of the late imperial household related to Emperor William to travel to Germany. The request not only was categorically refused but was the immediate cause of a decision to try the former imperial personages.

RETURNS FAVOR THE GOVERNMENT

Actual Counting of Military Votes Begun But Final Results Will Not Be Announced This Month.

Ottawa, Jan. 18.—The actual counting of the North American military vote cast in the Dominion elections has begun, but final results are not expected for a fortnight or so. So far as present indications show, it is understood that the vote is going strongly in favor of the government. How many seats will be affected, however, there is as yet no reliable return.

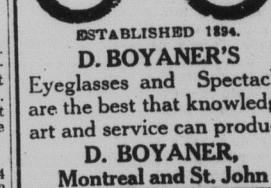
