SAVE YOUR TREES

In the April issue of the Canadian Horticulturist an editorial appeared under the heading of "Needless Vandalism".

In the May issue appears a letter to the Editor from Mr. Robson Black of Ottawa, Secretary Canadian Forestry Association in respect to the law in the trimming of trees on our public highways and as it will undoubtedly be interesting to our readers we reprint it herewith. "Will you kindly inform those of your readers living in Ontario that there is not the slightest reason for their submitting to any depredation to shade trees by the line-men of the Hydro and other public utility companies. The laws of the Province of Ontario place the ownership of shade trees in the name of the owner of the property in front of which the trees are growing. This applies to trees on the public highways as well as those on a private lawn or garden. This fact is but little known.

No public utility company or even a municipal government can damage shade trees on the highway without

the consent of the private owner. The Ontario Criminal Code also establishes penalties for anyone injuring a shade tree. From this it will be evident to your readers that the simple prohibition of vandalism on the part of the private owners is quite sufficient in the eyes of the law to deter any line-man from shading trees. Action can be taken if needed under the Lantario tree Planting Act".

Waterloo Receives Extra Car Wood

Have Received 100 Per Cent of Wood Ordered

With the arrival of an extra car load of wood yesterday from Algonquin Park the town have now received their full quota of wood this year making up the shortage on the other cars received.

Waterloo's consumption was 300 cords and it was found after measuring the wood in the yards here that there was a shortage of about 15 cords.

ANOTHER ARREST IN MURDER CASE

Chief Gorman of Galt brought to the County Goal yesterday afternoon the foreigner who was arrested at Stratford in connection with the murder of the man Brown at Galt on Sunday last.

This makes two prisoners now behind the bars one being detained as a material witness and the other as the probable perpetrator of the murder.

Both prisoners when searched did not have as much money on them as was at first supposed. The sum total of Ivan the supposed murderer, was about \$20 while Boyeff had been \$15 and \$17.00 on him when arrested.

Boyeff's story would seem to implicate Ivan and further developments are expected in the course of the next few days.

Both prisoners are taking their arrest quietly.

Provide \$75,000.

At the regular meeting of the Stratford Board of Works it was decided to recommend to the City Council that a by-law be submitted to the ratepayers at next election for the re-surfacing of the asphalt block pavement in the city at an estimated cost of \$75,000.

This action was taken after long deliberation on ways and means of repairing the pavement on Ontario Wellington and Downie streets which are all in a bad way and which as local improvement are not yet paid for.

The City Engineer's report dealt with actual work needed. The total area of asphalt blocks in Stratford is 30,954 square yards.

U.S. SEAPLANE, NC4 OBLIGED TO LAND

WILL NOT REACH PLYMOUTH TO-NIGHT

PLYMOUTH, Eng., May 30.—The United States naval seaplane, N.C. 4, left Lisbon for this port at 5.20 o'clock this morning. The N.C. 4 is expected to arrive here at about 4 o'clock this afternoon, British summer time.

BREST, May 30.—A message received here, relayed from the torpedo boat destroyer Woolsey, at Station C on the route of the N.C. 4, is interpreted by naval authorities here as meaning that the N.C. 4 developed trouble, but effected repairs and resumed her flight.

SAY THEY CAPTURED 70 GUNS

LONDON May 30.—Bolshevik forces have driven the Poles from Rovno after fierce fighting and occupied the town according to a wireless message from Moscow today.

SAYS MAYOR MACBRIDE, OF BRANTFORD, WHO SUGGESTS THAT SIR ADAM ADAM CALL CONVENTION.

BRANTFORD, May 29.—A request for Sir Adam Beck to issue a clarion call for a general convention of municipalities and labor bodies to take action over hydro matters was issued by Mayor MacBride this morning.

He states that since Sir Adam Beck had given labor the best conditions and terms of any organization in Canada it was up to labor to see that previously-owned power companies were not given an unfair advantage over the hydro as otherwise labor would be defeating its own project.

The Dominion Government should also be told to keep its hands off power development on the St. Lawrence, he says, and this development be left to the hydro to carry on.

If labor expects to command the respect and support of public opinion it cannot be dilatory in this matter, declared the mayor.
