EUGENICS NOW AND FIFTY YEARS AGO

London, Nov. 15.—In the quiet of her retreat at Farnborough, the venerable and forlorn Eugenie, once empsess of the French and "the most beautiful woman of Europe" will be able to recall within the mext day or two the fiftieth anniversary of one of the greatest triumphs of her brilliant career.

This was the formal opening of the Suez Canal, on November 17, 1869. Emporors Kings and potenates of many kinds took part in the elaborate ceremonies that attended the inauguration of the canal, but the Empress Eugenie took precedence of them all. The ships that first passed through the long, still line of clear green water were led by L'Aigle, the French imperial yneht. In front of L'Aigle floated a golden bee. Behind Eugenie's yacht floated a fleet—a fleet which carried almost all the known flags of all the nations. From boat to boat from shorts to shore, the cry rang out, "Vive l'imperatriee." That was half a century ago.

Mohammed Seid gave a grand ball in honor of the occasion. Probably so many nationalities of the carten never before been gathered together. The Empress Eugenie entered that packed assemb'y leaning upon the arm of the Emperor of Austria, followed by a representative of the Sulten of Turkey.
