The Brition market continues somewhat perplexing. Some impotters remint that weakness is in course of detelogment, while othery contend that the market is maintaining stability even in the face of very light buying. Agents of shippers report that it is most difficult to cleste contracts, but add that it will be absolutely necessary for importers to arranze for supplies at a very early dnte. In respect so Canadian lunber it can be said that first qualily pine dealy are now almost unobtainubl:, and sales of thiro quality have been made at $\mathrm{E}_{12}$ tos. to $£_{12}$ 15\% per atandard of 8,980 feet. For fourth quality there is little demand. Quebec spruce deals have recenily been sold in London at $695^{5}$. lor $q$-inch third quality, and E9 2ss. 6d. for unassonted. For New Brunswick aprece, per regular liners from St. Johu, the price is £7 75. 6d. 10 \& 7 IOs . per standard. The imports by the liners have been small, but stocky at Liverpool, Manchester and other ports are somewhat heavy. Liverpool trokers are said to have made good sales of spruce on the Conlinent and in Ireland.
At a recent auction asle $2 \times 1 /$ Quebec spruce brought $£^{12}$ per standard. A single lot of first quality white pine from Mlontreal, comprising $3 \times 1$, $3 \times$ ro and $3 \times 6$ and 7, sold at fis rose, whish was considered much below its value.

above the water mill, amounting to 12, ono, not more than 4,000 now remain. The balance are strown along the river and will liave to be collected and rafted duwn to a conventient place for booming and sawing.
Chicago reports a weak market for cooyerage steck. Tierce hoops which a few wecks ago were worth \$15 now ranke from $\mathrm{S}_{1} 10$ 10 $\$ 12$. There is practically no demand for staves, hoopy or heading. Buffalo jobbers quote first-cinss elm staves at $\$ 9.25$ to $\$ 9.50$; basvwond hexding, 6 to 6\% cenls; coiled hoops, $\$ 10$ to $\$ 10.50$ for $6.100 t$ and $\$ 9.75$ to \$in. 25 for 5 \% foot.
A despatch from Frederiction, N. B., states that driving operations havo commenced on most of the streams. R. A. Estey, Hillyard Broy., Murchie \& Sons and others whe operate on the Tobique river have engaged crews for driving. Donald Fraser \& Sons started operations last week and expeci to get about 12,000, 000 leet of logg. J. A. Patterson, who operates on the Salmon river, and J. H. Sawyer, on the Gulmac river, have made excelient progress with their drives. On the Restigouche the ice has been slow in me.ing.

## THE OTTAWA VALLEY.

(Correrpondence of the Caxada Loxisexman.)
With log driving well in hind on several streams, the lumbermen are now turning their attention to the mills. Preparations are well advanced for a grod season's cut. The cool spring presages a steady movement of logs, as the larger slreams will be fed gradually from. their tributaries during the late spring and early summer. The ice is not expected to move out of the more northerly crecks for another fontnight.
The first mill in the Ottowa district to resurde operations was that of the Hawkesbury Lumber Company, at Hawkesbury, Ont. The strike declared on Good Friday paralyzed operations, but it was of short duration.
The Beoth mill at Otsawz is running night and day, and will soon be employing belween 1,500 and 1,800 men and boys, in the mills and yards. The Mason millat Hir:onburg, secured by the Shepherd \& Morse Compant, with its new equipment, is about the only new thing outside the cstablishment of the Fraser mill at Desclienes, and Davidson \& Thackery's new mill at Davidson, Ouc., the new lumbering village in the Pontinc district.
Reference to the markel prge will show an advance in several lines of high grade stock. Even as a futurity it is exceedingly scarce, and it is figured that over onehalf of the 1903 mill cut has long cre this passed from the manufacturer to the British and American buyers. Local dealers are experiencing considerable difficulty in securing stock to supply the local market.
The first loge or the season are reported at the Coulonge boom, near the juncture with the Oltawa. Tire logs are part of a bunch of 100,000 cut for Davidson \& Thackery's new mill at Davidion station.

Mr. W. H. McAullife, the well known local lumber dealer, lias purchased an additional block of land in the Chaudiere
district adjoining his present extengive pilling and sorling grounds. He will erect a planing mill, and thus add an additional branch to his rapidly growing businesy.
Mensry. Hurdman \& Elmitt, one of Ol-
tawh's aggressive lumbet firms, have secured territory for piling grounds convenient to the city and in touch with the different lines of railway.
Mr. E. A. Chamberinin, formerly of the Janies MiacLaren Lumber Company, Buckingham, hay accepted a position on the construction work al Mr. Alex. Fraser's mew mill at Descheney, near Ottinks.
Mr. W. P. Hinton, general freight and passenger agest of the Canada Allartic Railway, way at its last meeting elected President of the Canadian Fieight Agenty Association. Mr. Hinton well deserves the honor, a point on which his friends in the lumber trade of Canada and the United States will agree. Although one of the youngent, he is one of the best informed railway men in America.
