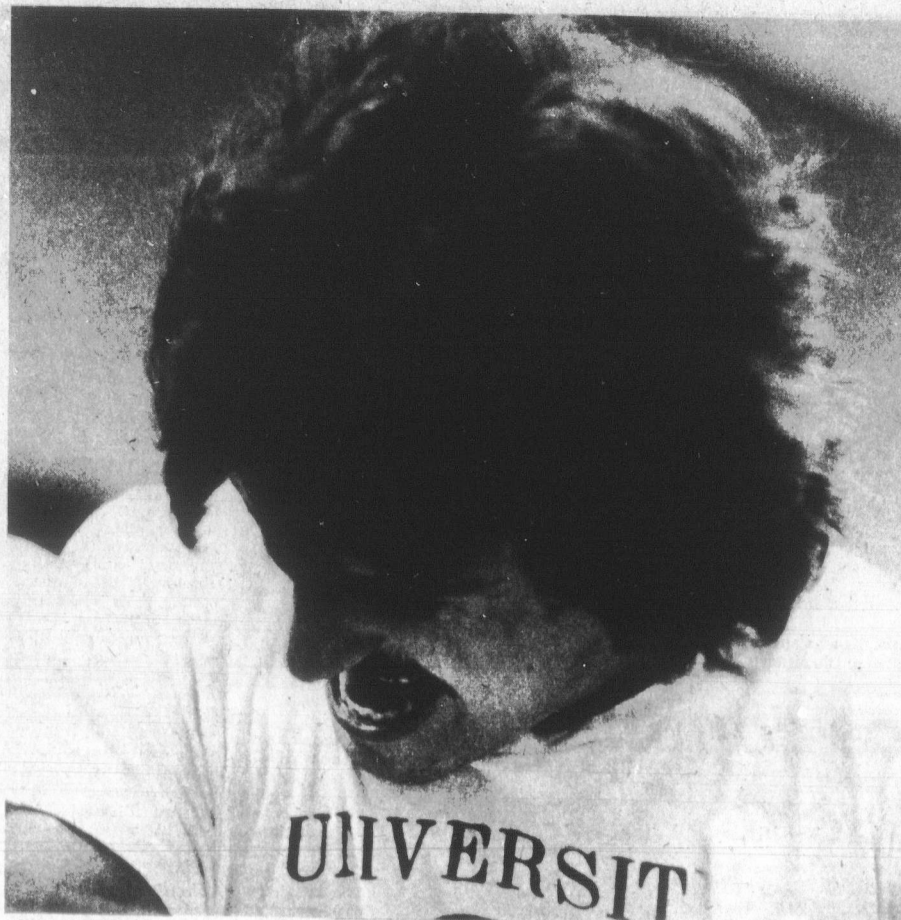

## Wristwrestling tourney is serious business now

When the Mississauga Open Wristwrestling Championships started two years ago, a lot of contestants had a lot of fun. Beer drinking and joking dominated the event with an occasional wristwrestling bout fought to legitimize the event.

Last year, at the second annual event, there were fewer attending the event for a good time than for the serious competition. This year, everybody came for the competition.

And why not? Carling O'Keefe put up \$200 for winners and \$100 for runners-up in each of three men's divisions. Trophies also went to the winners.

"I think that most of the competitors were physical fitness buffs of some sort," said meet organizer Claude Lewis of the host Clarkson-Lorne Park Lacrosse Association. "There were very few kibitzers, if any."

Mississauga's Ron Smith, defending champion in the lightweight division, bowed to Marcelle Giroux of Corbeil in the final. Giroux had a 31-pound weight advantage.

Brian Vesterback of Brampton defeated Bob Menard of Oshawa in the middleweight division. Menard was one of four brothers entered. His 55-year-old father did not enter the tournament this year due to cartilage problems in the knee.

Robert Snarey, the 292-lb defending champion, repeated in the heavyweight division with a win over 215-lb John Louvie of Scarborough in the closest final bout.

Sheila Paquette of Stratford defeated Emilie Holtz,

whose husband was also entered, in the women's final. First prize was \$75 and second prize \$50.

Six other Mississaugans were entered into the lightweight division — Karl McConnell, Tim Disero, Doug Reynolds, Nino Fatica, Steve White and Alex Sluiter. Stan Spring entered the middleweight division.

### Cooksville takes prize

Fran Rider, who batted 700 over the 13th annual York women's fastball tournament last weekend, in Toronto, led Cooksville Pizza Hut to a 2-1 victory over Peterborough for the consolation championship. Joanne Palmer was the winning pitcher, striking out four Peterborough batters.

## Mississauga dominates ball hockey trophy night

Mississaugans captured two of three major trophies handed out by the Provincial Ball Hockey Association at their awards banquet last Friday.

Russ Foster of Dixie Ventures was named the league's most valuable player. Foster, a member of the Dixie Beehives dur-

ing ice hockey season, took third place in overall scoring and was last season's rookie-of-the-year.

Kyle MacArthur of Erindale Nationals was named top rookie of 1978. MacArthur was fourth in overall scoring, far ahead of his other rookie competitors. In addition to the rookie trophy, a special

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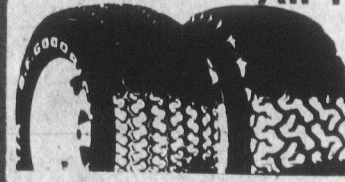
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
