 buried in oblivion, & we shall as in former
 times be a united body with one mind.
 After waiting some time for a reply from the
 Upper Mohawks, the Dep. Supt. General enquired,
 if they had any thing to say in reply to the advice
 of the Grandage Chief.

When Thomas Davis said. We were informed
 last year, that there was a prospect of our receiv-
 :ing our Prize money, for the Beaver Dam action,
 but we have not as yet seen it.

The Dep. Supt. General then addressed the whole
 My Brethren. I lament to see a determination
 on the part of a few of the Upper Mohawks not
 to unite. I see it is a personal business against
 myself, do not let it disunite you. I pray you
 will consider seriously, & become one. Let this
 business which appears merely an attempt to
 injure me, not affect you. It will be looked into
 & I have confidence that matters will come
out
