Dear Sir: Be it hereby resolved that the Regina Lions' Club unanimously endorse the efforts that are being made to grant to the blind over forty years of age, an allowance similar to that which applies to the Old Age Allowance Act, so as to make their lot a happier one.

You are well aware of what an affliction such as blindness would be to anyone, so there will be no call on our part to dwell upon what we believe to be a real necessity in making a Pension applicable to the blind throughout the whole of the Dominion. We believe that public opinion is strongly in favour of a move in this direction, so that the laws for a pension for the blind may be enacted so that these pensions may begin this year. There is no body, such as the blind, more deserving of assistance in this regard as they are so placed that they must, of necessity, be limited in carrying on activities which would enable them to live an average life as far as the necessities go.

By unanimous decision at our meeting held on 3rd June at the Champlain Hotel, we urge you to bring before the House of Commons at Ottawa, a measure that will provide for the blind, pensions that would be commensurate with what is deserving to this group of our citizens.
