My Dear Mr. Power:-

I am writing you on behalf of a son of a great personal friend of mine, the late albert Barton, of the Town of Lindsay.

Albert Barton was the President and Managing Director of Knitters Ltd. in this Town. He had two sons, his only children, namely Russell Barton and Wallace Barton, both young men, and who were both actively engaged in the welfare and were Officers of the Victoria and Haliburton Regiment before it was disbanded some years ago.

Russell Barton went to England in august 1937 and qualified as a Pilot Officer , with the 148th. Squadron . Unfortunately he was killed on the 22nd. of July 1939 in England when his plane was struck by lightning on a reconnaissance tour along with some other officers of his squadron. The father, Albert Barton, was at this particular time on his way to England to visit his wife, who was already there, and the two boys, when news of the death of this boy was delivered to him on board ship. The result of this shock caused the collapse of the father, and he passed away in the Town of Lindsay on the 3rd. of June 1940 , a war casualty. He never recovered from the shock which he received in the passing of his oldest son. Wallace Barton went to England in October, 1936, as a Pilot Officer, and he was promoted to Flight-Lieutenant in March 1940 in No. 4 squardron . Since that time he has seen continuous active service in France and Belgium since October 2nd. 1939 , and has over 800 flying hours to his credit.

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
