

those in authority and those judged capable of criticizing. Then they must be capable of teaching with enthusiasm, authority and attractiveness. Our Catholic students would be the first to benefit by this move. Later on other students eager to learn the truth would be attracted, and quite likely in large numbers. It can be readily realized what the scattering of such instructed men throughout our Province would mean to sound principles of morals and society.

As the fees for attendance on these lectures must necessarily be only nominal, support from other sources is absolutely necessary. The salaries for lecturers of the proper stamp must be large. This money must be found. The object being stated and properly understood throughout this Province, we believe there will be little difficulty in procuring it.
