stories, each representing a different section and variety of the Home Mission Field of the Southern Church, and each illustrated by a characteristic picture. The idea is a capital one. Along with each story, there is also a series of questions, the answers to which are to be found in the Missionary periodicals of the church.

The Ethics of Jesus: by Henry Churchill King, D.D., President of Oberlin College (The Macmillan Co., Toronto, 293 pages, \$1.00 net) is one of a series of valuable New Testament Handbooks, edited by Professor Shailer Mathews of the University of Chicago. They are intended to present briefly and intelligently the results of the scientific study of the New Testament, and are intended for the general reader, as well as the special student. The author's method is a detailed survey of all the passages in the teaching of Jesus that can be regarded as clearly ethical. Through this detailed study he brings out the ethical import. There is necessarily a discussion of origins and of the portions of the teachings of Jesus that may be regarded as primordial or original material. President King is an authority upon these points of scholarship and his work is done with great minuteness. A sentence or two from the closing page of the volume indicates the point of view. "An ethical system, then, in the sense of a modern, ordered discussion of technical theoretical problems, Jesus certainly does not have. But an ethical system, in the sense of thoroughly unified and consistent thinking on life, its end, spirit, motives, and means, he as certainly does have. And all this is put with marvelous practical incentive to living."

Communion with God, by Rev. D. Stone, D.D., and Rev. D. C. Simpson, D.D. (211 pages, \$1.20), is intended to help the ordinary reader to see the preparation for communion with God before Christ eame, and how it was realized through Him. The book elucidates difficulties in the study of religion and expounds New Testament instances of communion with God, with great clearness and power. Christ's Message of the Kingdom, by Prof. A. G. Hogg, M.A. (paper cover, 227 pages, 50c. net) will prove to be a boon to any who want a course of study in New Testament teaching. Prof. H. R. Macintosh, of Edinburgh, writes of it: "More than any book known to me, this one is successful, I think, in penetrating to vital truth in the transcendent phrases actually spoken by Jesus."

The Westminster Standard Teacher Training Course is the title of the First Standard Course issued by the Presbyterian Committee of Publication, Richmond, Va., in a compact, well printed, stiff-paper bound book of 191 pages, selling for 25c. Rev. Dr. A. L. Phillips, the Superintendent of the Southern Presbyterian Church's Sunday School and Young People's Work, is the editor. He has done his work with intimate knowledge of the subjects of the Course and of the persons who are likely to take it up. It is, in many respects, a model textbook, concise, ample, orderly, and printed so as to arrest the eye. A series of Questions is attached to each Lesson, of which there are fiftyfour in all, covering the five subjects of the First Standard Training Course, namely, The Old Testament, The New Testament, The Pupil, The Teacher, and The School

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
