' His Majesty's Council are at a Loss to know, what the Affembly mean by putting up the Duties at a ' higher Price than the Sum paid into the Treasury last ' Year, as the annual Payments into the Treasury do onot ascertain the full Amount of the Collection; and ' no Clause inserted in a Law could restrain the Far-· mer from profecuting on any of the feveral Acts rela-' ting to the Duties of Impost and Excise now in Force, ' provided they fuit his Purpose.

"Upon the whole, His Majesty's Council conceive ' the Measure inexpedient, difficult and dangerous, and ' if carried into Execution would produce numerous ' and manifest Evils.'
