ACCIDENT ON G. T. R.—On Friday last an accident occurred on the S. & H. division of the G. T. R. at Millbank station, an engine and several freight cars being thrown from the track and some what wrecked. SYNOD OF HURON.—The Synod of the Anglican Diocese of Huron has been in session at the Chapter House, city of London, this week. A large number of both clerical and lay delegates were in attendance. Rev. F. Courtney, of Chicago, preached the ordination sermon. Nine candidates were ordained to the Diaconate, their names being Messrs. E. S. Gray, M. Turnbull and H. Wylie, of Huron College, London; G. B. Sage, of Trinity College, Toronto; J. Hale, of B. Taylor, C. J. B. Bostone, of London, A. W. Chapman, of Boston, Mass. The Bishop, in his charge, spoke in a very interesting manner. His Lordship was also able to announce that the proposed Western University would in a very few months be in active operation. The annual diocesan missionary meeting was held in St. Paul's Church on Wednesday evening.

CHANGED HIS BASE.—Mr. Wm. Lowe, caretaker of the Listowel Public School and grounds, has resigned his situation to accept a position on the local staff of the Great Western Railway. Mr. Lowe has occupied the position of caretaker for many years and has always discharged his duties in a most capable manner. The ornate surroundings of the school bear ample evidence of this. It is largely due to Mr. Lowe's excellent taste that the grounds are now in such an orderly and attractive condition. While it is to be regretted that the school has lost a very efficient caretaker, Mr. Lowe is to be congratulated upon securing a better position, and one which he has no doubt he will fill to his own credit and to the satisfaction of the Company. On Tuesday afternoon the teachers presented Mr. Lowe with an elegant volume of Lowell's poems as a mark of their respect. The presentation was made by Mr. Rothwell, the Principal, and was accompanied by a few remarks by that gentleman, who expressed himself as sorry to part with one who had discharged his duties so well. Mr. Lowe, in reply, thanked them and wished them all success in their new employment.
