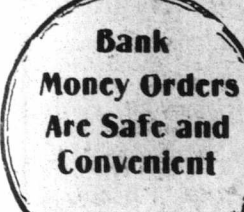

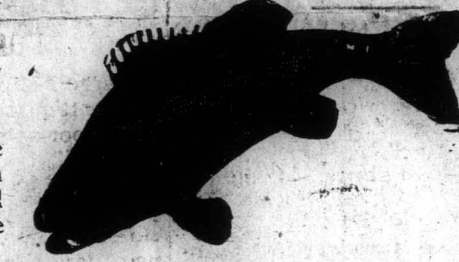

TORONTO, June 18.-Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards were 73 cars, 690 cattle, 1416 hogs, 615 sheep and lambs, and 270 calves.

Good to choice butchers sold at \$8.50 to \$9.50; medium butchers, \$8.25 to \$9.40; common, \$8.25 to \$9.75; choice cows, \$8.50 to \$9.75; good cows, \$8 to \$9.25; medium, \$7.75 to \$8; common cows, \$7.50 to \$8.50; bulls, \$4.50 to \$5.75.

Stockers and Feeders.

Feeders, 600 to 900 lbs. at \$3.35; stockers, 600 to 700 lbs., \$5 to \$5.85; eastern stockers, \$5 to \$6.50 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers.

The supply of milkers and springers was much greater than the demand, and the consequence being lower values. Prices ranged from \$40 to \$75 each. Extra choice cows sell at good prices, but it is the medium to good that have declined in price and they sold at about an average of \$10 per head less.

Veal Calves.

Calves were in demand at firm prices. Choice quality veal calves sold at \$8.50 to \$9.50; good calves, \$7.50 to \$8; common, \$6.50 to \$6.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs.

Light ewes sold at \$5.75 to \$6.25; heavy ewes and runs at \$5 to \$6; lambs sold at \$9 to \$11 per cwt.

Hogs.

Selects, fed and watered, sold at \$9.85 to \$9.90, and \$9.50 to \$9.60, f.o.b., cars at country points.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

MONTREAL, June 18.-Receipts of live stock at the C. P. R. live stock market for the week were, 625 calves, 600 sheep and lambs, 600 hogs, and 1400 calves. Prices for butcher cattle were firm, and in the better grades were 10 to 15c per-100 pounds higher than on Monday. Best butchers' stores sold at \$18.25 to \$19.50; fair, \$17.50 to \$18.50; and common, \$16.50 to \$18.50. Prices were about steady for small lots. Old sheep sold at \$4.50 to \$5.00; lambs, at \$4 to \$6. Calves sold at from \$8 to \$6. Hogs were easier, select lots selling at \$10.25 per cwt.

FIGHT ON IN BRITISH HOUSE TODAY

Premier Asquith and A. J. Balfour Both Indulge in Debate.

LONDON, England, June 19.-The opposition in the House of Commons is determined to press to a division its point of censure on the British Cabinet in connection with the scandals caused by ministerial transaction in Marcon's shares according to an announcement made by the Right Hon. Alfred Lyttleton, former Secretary of State for the Colonies, in the Unionist Cabinet at the resumption of the debate to-day. He held that the apology made by Attorney-General Sir Rufus Isaacs, was too much qualified and that the impugned cabinet ministers had not sufficiently clothed themselves with sackcloth.

Premier Asquith whose statement was eagerly awaited, as his attitude was calculated to sway the votes of the Independent Labor members and a number of Liberals expressed keen regret at the decision of the Tories. He said he had hoped that after the speeches of the ministers concerned some general agreement would have been reached by the House, but that hope was now shattered.

Asquith Feels It.

Mr. Asquith, who spoke with evident emotion, said he had never risen with greater reluctance to address the House of Commons or under a stronger sense of personal responsibility. He agreed that the Cabinet Ministers in question would have been better advised to have told the whole story in October during the Marconi debate. It would have saved an enormous amount of time and trouble. At the same time, however, he did not hesitate to say that the terms of the motion introduced by the Opposition were not only inadequate, but in the highest degree ungenerous. The parliamentary inquiry having proved that the charges had been conclusively disproved, it should have put it in the forefront of its resolution an explicit finding that the Cabinet Ministers had been faultlessly acquitted.

The Premier submitted that the two Cabinet Ministers had broken no rule of obligation, but had failed to observe a rule of prudence. He had, he said, never heard a fuller, franker or more manly explanation than the Ministers' had given. "The Ministers concerned have suffered for an error of judgment a penalty quite as heavy as ever visited such an error under similar circumstances. Is it wise or just for the House to persist in this motion? The Ministers have admitted their error, but their honor is unstained. They had abused no public trust, they retained the complete confidence of their political associates, and I ask the House to say that it repudiates the infamous calumnies which have been disproved, and to put on record that the House of Commons accepts their statements."

Balfour Speaks

Arthur J. Balfour, the former Unionist Prime Minister, followed Premier Asquith, and suggested that if the government supporters would agree to combine the motion with an amendment, the House would be unanimous. He himself, he said, regarded all the charges of corruption as absurd, but he insisted that the conduct of the two Cabinet Ministers was of the most vital importance to the public life of the country. There is no question of dishonesty, he declared. It is only the question of the gravest indiscretion. If possibly there was some doubt regarding the propriety of Attorney-General Sir Rufus Isaacs indulging in "what I am told is called a 'flutter' there is no doubt whatever that Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George should not have engaged in such dealings."

Mr. Balfour said that neither minister had expressed regret at the transactions. What they had regretted was the difficulties arising from them. The mistakes made in this case were, he declared, those of honest men and they should have expressed their regret about them.

He continued: "If the prime minister will find words in which to express the regret we all feel and which will be put in the journals of the house, he will find no enemies among the opposition. I appeal to him for the honor of the house to accept that which I suggest."

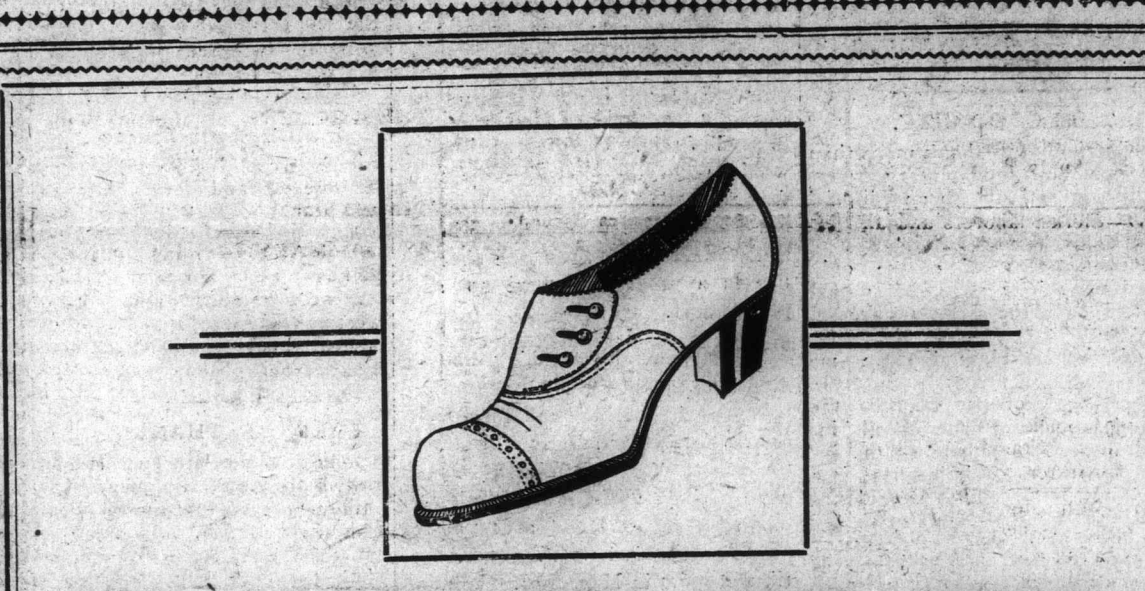
