NEW ONTARIO:

The Province of Ontario has an France or Germany. It has a populafion of 2,500,000. When you consider that France has nearly forty millions, and Germany nearly sixty-five millions, you get a faint idea of the possibilities of Ontario.

But there is another remarkable fact. The bulk of the population of Ontario is found within a very small part of its area-the southern part, nost of it lying within a couple of Hawkins, Guelph. hundred miles of Toronto. Though very sparsely settled it is not by any means inaccesible. It is traversed from east to west by the Canadian Pacific Railway, and ere long there will be three railways instead of one.
