**BRANTFORD LOSES DISTINGUISHED SON**

**Professor Duncan Passes Away in the City of Pittsburg.**

The Courier deeply regrets to record the death in Pittsburg this morning of Prof. R. Kennedy Duncan, one of the most brilliant and world-renowned of Brantford's sons.

Deceased, who was about forty years of age, passed from the Brantford Collegiate to Toronto University, where he graduated with high honors. Later he took post-graduate courses in the States and abroad. He was a Doctor of Science and made industrial chemistry his specialty. He held a professorial chair in Kansas University, and was also head of the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research at Pittsburg University. He had a staff of thirty experts under him in the last-named capacity, and revolutionized methods and results in many large concerns. More than once he refused large monetary offers from the latter for his sole services, because he felt that he could be of more use in the general field. He was the

author of widely-read works and was regarded as an authority. A few years ago Harper Bros., the well-known New York publishers, secured his services to go to Europe and write with regard to radium and other new scientific discoveries. While away he was paid marked attention by the leading science men of all lands, and was the guest of Carnegie and other notables. Norman Duncan, the well-known author, is a brother. He was a most likeable man in all essentials and not at all affected by the many honors of which he was made the recipient.

He leaves to mourn his great loss a widow (formerly Miss Lottie Foster, Brantford) and one daughter, Elspeth. In addition to them Norman Duncan was at the bedside when he fell asleep. F. Foster, E. Sweet, J. Ruddy and A. G. Olive, all of this city, are brothers-in-law, as was the late Milton Robertson, who passed away, also after an operation, only a few months ago. Miss Foster, likewise of this city, is a sister-in-law.

Messrs. Foster and Sweet have left for Pittsburg, and will bring the remains here for interment in Farringdon Church cemetery.

**Reciprocal Idea in Naturalizing Citizens**

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Hon. C. J. Doherty will shortly introduce legislation to make effective in Canada the new naturalization bill, which is designed to apply throughout the British Empire. The new bill requires five years for naturalization. Four of these can be spent anywhere in the British Empire, but the last year must be spent in the country in which naturalization is applied for.

For instance, a French subject might reside four years in Great Britain and the last year in Canada and be granted naturalization in the Dominion. Or he could live four years in Canada and the last year in Great Britain.

If other parts of the empire passed similar legislation this will apply there in the same way.

**George Roach' Formerly of Brantford, Only Ill Since Saturday.**

After being a patient in the Hamilton hospital only since Saturday, Geo. D. Roach, proprietor of the New American hotel, died yesterday morning shortly before noon. He was 39 years old. Since going to Hamilton about ten years ago, Mr. Roach was actively engaged in the hotel business. For two years after leaving Brantford, deceased was proprietor of the Strand.

He then went into partnership with his father, the late George Roach, in managing the New American, but since the death of the latter a few years ago he was sole proprietor. In all, he was connected with the latter hotel for eight years, and during that time made many improvements both to the interior and exterior of the buildings. He was well known by the sporting fraternity of the city, and had many friends, who will regret his death. Besides his wife, one daughter, Madeline, survives.
