

Fotoball Games For the J. Hill Charity Cup Get Under Way Saturday

Some of the best football of the season was seen in the games on Saturday for the John Hill Cup when no team had a runaway victory. The winners in the aggregate totalled nine goals and the losers solitary one gained by Paris against the Duffs. The scores denote the earnestness of the games.

The closest call being that of the Wanderers who just managed to get the point that saved them for the second round. They threw away two penalties however which might have added to their score. The Sons had hard luck in not equalising in their first rally when they bombarded the Wanderer's goal. It was a sporting chance and they lost.

The P. S. A. boys must have played creditably to tie the Scots down to a two goal victory. In recent combats the Scotchmen had shown the Congregationalists no quarter and a larger score was expected of them.

Tutela again proved invincible when they mastered the Tigers by three goals, this being the best score of the series. Both teams were in good condition but the strength of Tutela was too much for the Holmedales who had not the fine combination of Tutela. It was a strenuous game and Holmedale did not give up hopes until the end.

The Parisians were overcome by the Duffs who played splendid soccer against their opponents. The Frenchmen however were not easy picking and equalised after a lead had been established. They nearly accomplished this a second time but for the brilliant defence work of the Duffs. The final score was a pretty fair reflex of the game.

Wanderers vs. S. O. E.
The above teams met on the Recreation Park in the John Hill Charity Cup before a moderate crowd. The Wanderers winning the toss, took advantage of the wind and sun from the kick off, the Wanderers took a strong hold of the game but were not able to do much owing to the Sons being one man short and playing the one back game offside, spoiling many chances which fell to the Wanderers. After 15 minutes play the Wanderers were awarded a penalty kick. Bonner took the kick and the Sons goal keep managed to tip it over the bar, giving a corner, but nothing came of it. Bonner made amends for this shortly after, for from a nice pass from Mears he scored an easy goal. After this the Sons' eleventh man came upon the field, but the Wanderers still held the whip hand and missed some very good chances. Half time arrived and the teams crossed over with the Wanderers leading by the only goal scored. The game started off at a fast pace, both goal tenders being tested in turns. After about 20 minutes play another penalty was awarded to the Wanderers. J. Little taking the kick but nothing came of it, as the ball was lifted high over the cross bar. The Sons now started pressing the game to get on level terms and a few corners fell their way, but Dudden was playing a fine game in goal for

the Wanderers who managed to hold their own until the whistle blew, and after a very fast and hard game the Wanderers entered the next round by winning one to nil.

It was with somewhat mixed feelings, judging by remarks overheard, that spectators assembled at Agricultural Park last Saturday when the Duffs and Paris teams met in the second round for the John Hill Cup. Both teams were at full strength. The ground was in excellent condition, thanks to the energetic park-keeper, Mr. Abbott. There were about 600 spectators present when Paris won the toss and decided to play towards the town goal. Joe Holland started the ball rolling for the Duffs who immediately attacked the Paris citadel, but the Paris defence was in great form and held the Duffs forwards well. The visitors took matters in hand and showed glimpses of pretty passing among their forwards, but Harbour and Bill Holland checked their advance time after time. The Duffs made a determined attack on the visitors' goal and after splendid combination among the players, Humphries placed the ball nicely to Usher who scored with a swift low drive. Paris seemed to live up after this reverse and equalized with a long shot which the "home custodian" stopped but fumbled.

The remainder of this half saw both goals visited in turn, play being very even. After a pretty movement started by Joe Holland, Usher again scored a dandy goal.

Half time score: Duffs 2, Paris 1.

Notwithstanding the Duffs lead, Paris resumed in determined fashion, and splendid efforts were made by their forwards to equalize. Kewles being called upon to save several times. Gradually the Duff took matters in hand. Poynter, Holland, Humphries having very hard lines of scoring, a magnificent game was being assisted by the two backs. Usher accepted a pass and put in terrific drive which the Paris custodian stopped but did not hold. Poynter made the goal more certain by placing the ball in the corner of the net. Humphries put in a centre, Holland gathered the ball and put in a shot which struck under the cross bar. Paris played gamely until the whistle blew for time.

Result: Duffs 3, Paris one.

Both teams played good, clean football and the game was interesting from start to finish.

Paris have a good team—full of football. So well did the Duffs play as a whole that it would be invidious to specially praise any one or two members of the team.

Biggs was off the field fifteen minutes through injury. The jovial trainer, Blues, as usual, proved very useful to both teams.

The Duffs football team will practice as usual on Tuesday and Thursday nights at Agricultural park at 7 p.m.

LONDON TROUNCES BRANTFORD, 16-0

Locals Present Only 8 Men on Field and Are Completely Outclassed

LONDON, July 6—Six man teams in professional hockey may have made the game faster, the word of those in the know has to be taken for that assertion but after the demonstration of eight man lacrosse furnished by Brantford and London at the fair grounds oval on Saturday, those in attendance will be a unit in declaring that the innovation is far from a success. Although London won by an overwhelming array of goals, 16 to 0, coming somewhere near 75 actual count, the game played with eight men aside owing to the inability of Brantford to bring a full team looked more at times like a trans-Atlantic chess game than an exhibition of the national pastime.

Visitors' Third Game.

Brantford made a silent protest to the O. A. L. A. executive for making them play three games within a week by playing a listless, disinterested game. Slatery, usually with enough pepper for a whole team himself, was badly used up and except for one or two spurts made no effort to stem the tide of London goals. Shannon, another of the regular team, was the one bright spot in the game. He had a lot of fun all by himself, in an effort to keep out of the s-dry drizzle, which would have been a downpour otherwise. London, on the other hand had a splendid workout. The defence were spectators most of the time and the home roped around in an effort to see how long they could keep the ball before having to shoot. Allan Kinder of Preston, referred.

In the first quarter, London was under a delusion as to how easy it was to score and only scored two goals, these going to Hawkins and McKinnon. The third quarter was enlivened by a set between McKinnon and Martin, one of the Indians of the Brantford team, which became general for a minute. After that quieted down the steady movement towards the Brantford goal resulted, the result of which was five more goals to the already large total.
