The masts are so situated that all the hatches can be worked at one time. The hull is on the whaleback

The Lime Branch is a new steamer having been launched at Sunderland last year. She measures 3,468 tons in depth and has a beam of 54 feet heavy cargo of wheat. Included in the cargo of the Lime Branch is a cougar and a kangaroo.
